



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## Two receive life sentences in murder of outlaw biker

Two members of an outlaw motorcycle club received life sentences in connection with the 2015 kidnap, torture and murder of a former member of the club whose body was dumped near Ridgefield.

On April 14, Mark Leroy Dencklau, 61, of Woodburn, and Chad Leroy Erickson, 51, of Rainier, received life in prison following a December conviction in federal court of murder in

aid of racketeering, kidnapping in aid of racketeering resulting in death, kidnapping resulting in death and conspiracy to commit kidnapping resulting in death. Dencklau was also found guilty of a racketeering conspiracy.

Dencklau was the Portland chapter president of the Gypsy Jokers Outlaw Motorcycle Club and Erickson was a member, a release from the Oregon district of federal court stated. It described the club as a "hierarchical criminal organization" with members participating either directly or

indirectly in "various acts of violent racketeering activity including murder, kidnapping, robbery, extortion, narcotics trafficking and witness tampering."

The Gypsy Jokers have been active in several states since the 1980s, and until recently, operated six clubhouses in the Pacific Northwest, the release stated. The club also has chapters in Australia, Germany and Norway.

Dencklau served as the Portland chapter president from 2003 until he was arrested. The Gypsy Jokers oversaw a number of sup-

port clubs in Oregon and Washington whose members took part in criminal activity to support the Gypsy Jokers, serving as a source of new members and revenue.

Dencklau and Erickson's sentence comes in connection with the 2015 death of Robert Huggins, an estranged member of the Gypsy Jokers' Portland chapter. On July 1, 2015, Clark County Sheriff's deputies responded to a field near the intersection

## Woodland City Council appoints Doughty to vacant seat

Woodland City Council's newest member wants the city to be the kind of place that drew her to the community five years ago after decades of moving around.

During its April 18 meeting, the council appointed Melissa Doughty to a seat on the council with a 6-0 vote. Doughty was one of six applicants for the position left vacant by former councilor Dave Plaza after he resigned in February. Of the six, five attended an interview at the end of the city council's meeting as they shared why they wanted to fill the seat.

Alongside Doughty, who is a long-term substitute teaching English language arts at Woodland Public Schools, there was mortgage loan processor Karen L. Shattuck and equipment operating engineer Robert Richardson who are relative newcomers to the city. The applicants also included former city councilor Janice Graham and past council candidate Keith Bellisle. Retired U.S. Air Force officer Edward Linnett applied for the seat but did not attend the interview.

Doughty said her family moved to Woodland in 2017. After moving across the country with her husband who was in the U.S. Navy, he retired after 23 years of service at the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, which made putting down roots in the

## Interstate 5 bridge replacement will likely utilize light rail

The program to replace the aging Interstate 5 bridge inches closer to a final design as scenarios currently under consideration are likely to use light rail as its mass transit component.

During meetings on April 21, the Interstate Bridge Replacement Program Executive Steering Group and the Joint Oregon-Washington Legislative Action Committee were briefed by program staff on what the bridge replacement could look like. Of the two options currently on the table, both will utilize light rail.

In order to be eligible for federal funding, a mass transit component is necessary. Light rail, alongside bus rapid transit, were under consideration for that requirement, though staff said the benefits of light rail are greater.

Information presented at the legislative committee meeting showed light rail options would be eligible for more funding from the Federal Transit Administration Capital Investment Grant, though bus rapid transit would cost less overall and federal funding would make up slightly more proportionally.

IBRP Assistant Program Administrator Frank Green said a preliminary cost estimate shows the replacement would cost between \$3.2 and \$4.8 billion. Alongside federal grant opportunities, he said the project would seek state-level funding in 2023. Washington state already committed \$1 billion in funding during the Legislature's 2022 session.

Green anticipates the use of tolling to fund the replacement in part to serve as local matching funds for federal grants.

IBRP Deputy Program Manager John Willis said project research shows there is a greater demand for light rail than bus rapid transit. He noted capacity-wise, a two-car train could hold up to 266 passengers, while a bus could hold up to 100.

Though light rail would have a higher capital cost up front, Willis said its maintenance and operations costs through its lifespan would be lower than buses.

Light rail was part of the failed Columbia River Crossing (CRC) project, and was part of what derailed that effort in 2013 when the Washington Legislature denied funding. Much has changed in the years

since, Willis explained, leading to a plan that still utilizes the transportation mode but with different parameters.

In 2013, Clark County's transit authority, C-Tran, started to use its Vine bus rapid transit network. Vancouver has also experienced development on its waterfront which the replacement project considered when drafting the transit option.

The project's light rail line would extend north from the Portland Expo Center's MAX train station. A major change for the current light rail option compared to the

CRC proposal includes aligning the tracks with Interstate 5 past the bridge north and ending at

Evergreen Boulevard. In the prior project, the line was set to run through downtown Vancouver.

C-Tran Chief Executive Officer Shawn Donaghy explained the development downtown since 2013 made extending light rail to that location less viable. Donaghy noted the transit authority has a second Vine line under construction, one in the planning stages and an extension to the existing Fourth Plain Boulevard line.

"By the time we actually construct the bridge, our (bus rapid transit) connection will be built. We'll be waiting for that connection at Evergreen," Donaghy said.

Though extending the light rail line as far north as Kiggins Bowl was initially under consideration, having it terminate

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# Two Ridgefield officers honored with lifesaving award

Two Ridgefield police officers were honored for their efforts as they assisted suicidal individuals on separate occasions in February.

During Ridgefield City Council's April 14 meeting, RPD officers Nic Siem and Craig Wattson received lifesaving awards. RPD Chief John Brooks introduced the officers and recounted their deeds which led to the recognition.

Both will receive medals for being officers "that really stood out and did the most important thing that we can do, and that is protect and preserve life," Brooks said.

"We are really fortunate to have such an incredible group of police officers," Brooks said.

On Feb. 20, officer Siem was dispatched to a call about a suicidal woman who was intoxicated and bleeding from self-inflicted cuts, Brooks said. The woman had been video chatting with a friend before she lost consciousness.

Siem found the woman in her bedroom, and attempted to wake her multiple times, Brooks said. Siem was familiar with the woman's history of substance abuse, and administered naloxone nasal spray to counteract the effects of a suspected opioid overdose.

Brooks said the woman almost immediately regained consciousness. Paramedics arrived on scene and treated her injuries.

Brooks said it was Siem's second time using naloxone to counteract a drug overdose in the past year.

Siem was recognized by two fellow Ridgefield officers, Sgt. Jason Ferriss and Officer Tyler King, who authored a memo highlighting Siem's actions. Brooks said Siem is known for his communication skills and his ability to connect

with individuals in crisis.

Seven days later on Feb. 27, officer Wattson was dispatched to the Interstate 5 overpass on Pioneer Street to a report of a suicidal man. The man sat on the overpass railing and was hanging onto a light pole, Brooks said.

At the same time, a call for a physical disturbance at a nearby apartment complex came in, Brooks said.

"Both calls required an urgent response, but officer Wattson was the sole officer on duty at the time," Brooks said.

The chief said Wattson coor-

minated with a neighboring police agency so they could respond to the disturbance while he handled the suicidal individual. While organizing assistance from crisis response teams, Wattson developed a rapport with the man. He learned the man had multiple life issues and said he had "nothing to live for," Brooks quoted.

Wattson was able to coax the man down and into the patrol car to relax, Brooks said, offering the man food and water while they waited for medical services to arrive.

"Officer Wattson's kindness and

compassion" convinced the man to voluntarily seek professional mental health assistance, Brooks said, and he was transported to the hospital.

Brooks said Wattson's actions were recognized by Washington State Patrol Sgt. Joshua Merritt, who wrote to Brooks to express how impressed he was with one of his officers.

"He did a great job and I would be highly confident in having him speak with anyone in a crisis situation," said Brooks as he read what Merritt wrote.

Following the call at the overpass, Wattson received information

from the responders to the physical disturbance call which he then relayed to the oncoming police shift, Brooks said. That information led to the arrest of someone wanted by U.S. Marshals on felony charges.

"Officer Wattson's training and years of experience allowed him to go above and beyond his normal duties by simultaneously (dealing with) two priority calls, coordinating multiple resources and ultimately saving the life of a citizen from suicide," Brooks said.

# Battle Ground Healthcare receives \$166,000 grant

Battle Ground Healthcare recently received a \$166,000 grant from the M.J. Murdock Charitable Trust.

The money will be used for new development staff to service underserved patients in the area, stated a news release.

Four Vancouver-based organizations also received funding. The Police Activities League of Southwest Washington received \$169,500 for new development staff, the Northwest Association for Blind Athletes received \$322,500 for new program staff, Innovative Services Northwest received \$104,000 for a facility renovation and Columbia River High School received \$10,000 for a Partners in Science Supplemental program.

The trust's winter 2021 grants report included 103 grants totaling

more than \$30 million that were distributed to nonprofits serving the Pacific Northwest. Of those, 38 grants, totaling more than \$9 million, were awarded to nonprofits serving the communities of Washington.

The Murdock Trust awarded over \$110 million to nonprofits in the Pacific Northwest in 2021. They provided 460 grants, which was a record for annual giving by the foundation that was established in 1975. To date, the Murdock Trust has awarded more than \$1.2 billion in grants.

# Woodland trap team prepares for upcoming of tournaments

The Woodland High School trap team is vigorously preparing to attend a championship event in Texas this June.

Coach Jason Hathaway said the students on the team recently competed at the Seattle Skeet and Trap Shotgun Challenge in Ravensdale, where they performed well.

“They’re progressing well, and it seems like their scores keep going up and up,” Hathaway said. “The big thing for our kids is we have two trap clubs we shoot at, but there’s three different disciplines within the shotgun sport, which is trap shooting, skeet shooting and sporting clays. Unfortunately, our kids only get to practice the trap discipline due to lack of facilities in the area.”

He said if the students place in the other two disciplines they don’t receive a lot of practice in then it’s “a real testament to the kids’ abilities.”

According to Hathaway, trap shooting features a machine that throws clay pigeons in front of the shooter, while skeet shooting utilizes trap machines located to the left and right of the athlete. The clay pigeons cross each other in midair. Sporting clays, on the other hand, features a golf-life course where shooters walk to different trap machines that can fire from any direction.

The team was started in 2012 by Ben Musgrove and Larry Wingfield, according to Hathaway.

“It started like most teams do and it’s grown to one of the largest high school shooting teams in the state,” he said.

To prepare for upcoming competition, Hathaway said the kids shoot up to 100 targets a week. They also competed in tournaments every weekend in April.

The students are trained in gun safety and are part of the USA Youth Education in Shooting Sports (USAYESS) program.

“They offer a gun safety and gun fitting course. It’s a two-day course, and we go out and learn how to instruct kids properly, how to fit kids into the proper-sized shotgun, how to teach them what

their dominant eye is so they shoot with the correct hand,” Hathaway said. “There’s a lot of fundamentals that go into it just like any other sport.”

The students also learn about ethics and other essential shooting skills, like leaving the chamber open when they are not shooting, and keeping their gun clean.

The team will attend a state tournament in Seattle at the end of April. They are also set to attend the Northwest Washington Open in May.

Although the season officially ends in May, Hathaway said the team plans to compete at the USAYESS National Junior Clay Target Championships in San Antonio, Texas in June.

Eleven kids from the team are set to compete at the event.

“That’s the most kids we’ve ever taken to nationals, so we’re really excited about the opportunities that are coming,” Hathaway said. “Last year, we had three kids go to nationals and they did really well, as they all brought home awards from it.”

Hathaway said senior Dane Hauge and seventh grader Hunter Gates, who is new to the team, have performed well. Hauge, who is captain, has been shooting with the team since his freshman year.

“He’s one of those quiet leaders on the team. He’s always one of the first ones there and one of the last ones to leave, always going the extra mile to make sure that the facilities are clean and in good working order,” Hathaway said. “He also always goes out of his way to help new shooters learn the sport, and be confident and excited about it.”

Hathaway said Gates is “a good representation of the Woodland trap team” because of his passion for the sport and how quickly he picked up competitive shooting.

“His progression from September to now is just amazing,” Hathaway said. “He’s one of the most improved shooters on the team, and I’m really looking forward to the next four or five years with these kids because you can see the potential on the horizon for how successful they’re going to be.”

The agriculture program at Woodland High School will host its 32nd annual FFA plant sale on Friday, April 29.

This year's event will feature a return to in-person shopping. The past two years, purchases during the plant sale had to be made online because of COVID-19 restrictions.

Shoppers will be able to peruse a wide variety of plants offered by the horticulture students at Woodland High School during the sale, stated a news release.

"The return of in-person shopping also offers invaluable learning experiences for students participating in the WHS agriculture classes as students are responsible for operating and managing the greenhouse," stated the release.

Students take on a wide range of business roles that include things like customer service, the creation of marketing materials, and the management of inventory.

"We are excited to return to in-person this year," stated horticulture teacher Kendra Pearce in the release. "The plant sale is

a community tradition that has held fast during the pandemic but being able to offer students and community members the opportunity to interact and participate fully is what it is all about."

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## TIPS FOR WRITING AN OBITUARY

Coping with the death of a loved one is never easy. Even those comforted by the acknowledgment that a recently deceased friend or family member lived a full life may still struggle with the sense of loss that comes with the passing of a loved one.

Obituaries do not necessarily have to follow a formula, but the following tips can help people compose an obituary that conveys who their deceased loved one was and how much this person meant to friends and family.

- **Contact your local newspaper.** Some newspapers may have obituary guidelines that govern things like writing style and obituary length. Before writing an obituary, contact your local newspaper to determine if they have any such rules in place. Some newspapers may only publish obituaries written by their own staff members.

- **Do not feel obliged to include cause of death.** While acquaintances who first learn of a person's death via an obituary may be curious about cause of death, loved ones of the deceased do not have to include such information if they are uncomfortable doing so. Many obituaries never include such information, so readers likely won't expect it. Those who are comfortable including such information in the obituary may find it helps them avoid having to answer numerous inquiries about the loved one's demise at the ensuing visitation and funeral services.

- **Include some biographical information.** Obituaries are typically more than simple announcements of death. Some simple biological information can shed light on who the deceased was and his or her personal and professional accomplishments. Avoid getting too detailed, as newspapers may not accept obituaries that are very lengthy. But biographical information like full name, place of birth, family (i.e., spouse, children, grandchildren, etc.), military service, place of employment, charity work, and hobbies can give readers an accurate idea of the life your loved one lived.

- **Include visitation and funeral information.** Be sure to include the day, location and visitation hours for viewings. If the funeral will be public, include the day and time of the funeral as well.

# East Fork Community Coalition plans to express opposition to Yacolt Mountain Quarry expansion

The Clark County hearings examiner will hold a hearing on April 28 about the Yacolt Mountain Quarry's application to expand.

A news release from the East Fork Community Coalition stated the current 83-acre quarry plans to expand to include an additional 110 acres.

The coalition plans to attend the meeting to ask the hearing examiner to reject the quarry's application until a full environmental impact statement is completed and Clark County enforces compliance with the quarry's conditional use per-

mit, stated the release.

"Tenuous ecological issues, such as landslide potential above Lucia Falls Park, homes, and the East Fork Lewis River, as well as run off into the river that threatens endangered species of salmon and steelhead, are key among the complaints," stated the release from the coalition. "Beyond that are health concerns."

The notice for the meeting states "the purpose of the public hearing is to review the proposed site plan and conditional use permit for surface mining and to review any SEPA appeals that may be filed."

# State Rep. Vick will not seek re-election

State Rep. Brandon Vick announced he will not run for re-election this year, making his fifth term representing Washington's 18th Legislative district his last.

On April 13, Vick, R-Vancouver, announced his decision, which capped off a decade of representing North Clark County in Olympia. In a news release, he said he wants to transition back into the private sector "and let someone else take the reins."

"I've always viewed elected office as a public service, not a career path," Vick said.

He said when he first joined the Legislature, his daughter was a newborn.

"That baby girl is now almost 10 and that sure puts things into perspective," Vick said. "While I am not exactly sure what the next phase in life will bring, being close to home and present at all of those softball tournaments, basketball games, and life events is my top priority."

Vick said his goal ever since he started as a state representative was to be a champion for small business, "(to) provide every company and individual the opportunity to be economically successful in the state of Washington," he stated in the release.

Vick has worked on various business-focused committees during his tenure, including the House Finance, Appropriations, and Commerce and Gaming committees. He also served as the ranking member of the House Consumer Protection and Business Committee, the release stated.

"In nearly a decade serving the state of Washington as a legislator in the House of Representatives, I have had the honor and responsibility of representing my community, its people and its businesses, coming to the table with creative solutions to our state's most complex challenges," Vick said.

House Republican Leader J.T. Wilcox said Vick is "a quiet voice for common sense and the best possible government function since the day he was sworn into office."

Wilcox said Vick garnered deep respect at the statehouse, mentioning his eye-catching choices of footwear on the House floor.

"Brandon was also known for his unusual shoes. And they will be hard shoes to fill," Wilcox said.

Vick's goal in Olympia was to improve the economic outlook in Washington, most notably through reducing complication and confusion for those trying to do business in Washington, the release stated.

Vick said he built relationships across the political aisle through his work. He said it was important to have good working partnerships with individuals across political persuasions.

"If we focus on the policy, and not the headline, we can do great things for the people of Washington state," Vick said. "We have all witnessed the increased polarization that has taken place in our political process,

and I truly hope that those who come next will continue to work to bridge that divide."

Vick introduced and was the primary sponsor of 14 bills that were signed into law during his tenure. He also co-sponsored hundreds of others focused on business growth and development, the release stated.

"There are so many people looking to pursue a career or business path that run into endless rolls of red tape in our state," Vick said. "Reducing government's role in economic development was his way to 'put the people first.'"

"When we let people and business innovate, that's when we have the most success," Vick said.

The lawmaker reflected on the friendships he made and the constituents and businesses he encountered while representing the 18th district.

"There are many great things about this job, but the most rewarding has been the opportunity to see people achieve success thanks to good legislation," Vick said.

Vick's next move isn't planned yet, but he wants to stay active and involved in the community as a private citizen. He thanked his wife, Darci, and their daughter, Makena, for their support of his lawmaking career.

"They sacrificed nights, weekends, and sometimes months at a time so that I could do this job to the best of my ability. I can't thank them enough," Vick said.

He also thanked his parents Tom and Dianne, his colleagues, his legislative staff and those who supported his several campaigns, as well as his legislative assistant Peter Gilmour, who had been a part of his office from day one.

"If you ever interacted with our office, he was the first one you talked to. Peter has served the people of the Eighteenth District admirably for the past 10 years and made it possible for me to find success," Vick said.

### A replacement lined up

Both Vick, representing the 18th District's position 1, and his counterpart, Larry Hoff in position 2, have announced they won't be seeking re-election this year. A change in state district boundaries following the 2020 Census means those who will represent the district could be from different geographic areas.

Although the district still represents Battle Ground, much of its old eastern and northern area was removed, with its boundaries shifting south into the Salmon Creek area.

Vick's seat already has a replacement eyeing the spot. The day after the incumbent announced he won't run again, fellow Republican Stephanie McClintock said she is seeking election.

McClintock previously served as the Clark County Republican Party Chair in 2012. She took over the position from Vick after he sought election to the Legislature. She also served a term on the Battle Ground Public Schools Board of Directors from 2013 to 2017.

"Public education is funded by property owners and we need to see results of those dollars in our students' knowledge of core subjects and offer robust career and technical education classes," McClintock stated in the release.

Noting her father served as a detective for 31 years, McClintock said support of law enforcement is a chief focus she would have at the state level. Locally, the Clark County Sheriff's Office, which covers unincorporated parts of the district, has faced staffing shortages, and

police departments statewide have raised concerns over the effect recent laws have on their duties.

"The high crime rates we have today are a result of little to no consequences to those that break the law. We must fully fund law enforcement and enforce our laws," McClintock said in the announcement. "Under the leadership of Governor Inslee and the Democrats in the state Legislature, we've seen higher taxes and rising crime in our communities. We can do better, and I'm prepared to be a commonsense voice in Olympia

as I work to make our state a better place to live and raise a family."

In her campaign announcement, McClintock said she already received several endorsements from local Republican representation, including Vick, Hoff, 18th district Sen. Ann Rivers, 17th district Sen. Lynda Wilson and Rep. Paul Harris.

"Stephanie has spent many years working hard to improve our community and I am confident she will carry that mindset with her as a legislator," Vick stated in the announcement.

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# Clark County's recent case rate sees uptick, no deaths reported

Clark County's recent COVID-19 case rate rose for the second week in a row, though no deaths were included in the latest report.

Clark County Public Health's April 21 report showed 35.7 COVID-19 cases per 100,000 population over seven days, a 37% increase from the 26 per 100,000 reported the prior week. Even with the relatively large increase from prior weeks, the recent case rate was still significantly lower than the all-time peak of 1,715.5 per 100,000 in seven days reported in January.

Recent case rates lag behind the most recent counts of cases. The health department's most recent case rate was based on activity from April 5 to April 11.

The health department reported 339 new cases between April 14 and April 21, more than the 205 reported between April 7 and April 14.

The update on April 21 included 279 confirmed cases and 60 suspected cases based on antigen testing. In total, there have been 74,271 confirmed and 14,690 probable


cases in Clark County since the outbreak began.

Clark County Public Health's April 21 report did not include any confirmed COVID-19 deaths for the second straight week. No deaths suspected to be due to the disease were reported, whereas on April 14 an additional suspected death was tallied.

A week of no deaths keeps Clark County's total at 795, including 704 confirmed and 91 suspected to be due to COVID-19.

The number of COVID-19 patients occupying hospital beds in Clark County decreased. As of April 21, 4.9% of beds had either patients with confirmed COVID-19 or patients awaiting test results, lower than the 5.2% reported the week prior. There were no COVID-19 patients in intensive care unit (ICU) beds in the county, down from 4.3% reported April 14.

New COVID-19 hospital admissions saw a slight drop in the latest data. In its April 21 report, the health department reported 1.2 admissions per 100,000 population in the past seven days, down from 1.4

admissions per 100,000 population reported April 14. Total hospital bed occupancy in the county increased, while ICU occupancy saw a slight decrease. The health department reported 98.4% of hospital beds and 94.2% of ICU beds were occupied in the county, compared to 96.4% of all beds and 95.7% of ICU beds on April 14. Clark County's statewide share of confirmed COVID-19 cases and deaths stayed about the same as of April 21 compared to the prior week. The Washington State Department of Health reported the county had about 6% of cases and 6.3% of deaths.

# County redistricting map once again heads to public hearing

The Clark County Council voted on a rollback of sorts in its ongoing council redistricting process, as the council selected a boundary map that was initially created by an independent committee.

During an April 19 meeting, the council voted 3-0 to approve a map supported by the majority of the Clark County Redistricting Committee. A public hearing on the map is scheduled for April 27. The map, dubbed "B2" during the now-disbanded committee's process, failed to meet the four-fifths threshold for the committee's official approval, but was still forwarded to the council for consideration. That led to a protracted process where the county council decided to send the maps under consideration back to the committee, experienced deadlocks in voting and received accusations of council meddling in the process.

During an April 13 meeting, the council voted to direct staff to generate a map based on what was put in front of voters in November without considering where current councilors live. The meeting was a public hearing on another map which took that into account, which resulted in public outcry in most of the testimony received.

Currently, the map in effect is one voters approved in an amendment to the county's home rule charter, which changed the number of districts from four to five. The amendment also made the formerly at-large council chair position an appointed position by the members of the council.

That map had flaws. The most evident was that the map did not take into account updated popu-

lation data from the 2020 Census. In the voter-approved map, District 5 was more than 5,400 people below the equal-distribution target, roughly five times the deviation from the target deemed acceptable.

The council tasked Paul Newman, a Clark County Geographic Information Systems analyst who designed some of the previous alternative maps, to craft a new one based on what voters approved. In that map, District 5's deviation was only 468 people below target.

Newman explained the map supported by most of the redistricting committee had about half the amount of deviation from the target populations as the newest map across all districts, though the one generated for the council had more geographically compact districts. As district populations get closer to each other, how compact they are start to drop, Newman explained.

Newman said both the new map and the one supported by most of the committee had the same deviation of only 12 precincts shifting districts from the voter-approved map.

Councilor Gary Medvigy moved to go back to the B2 map, which shifted districts of two of the four current councilors. That map shifted council chair Karen Bowerman into Medvigy's District 4, and councilor Julie Olson into the currently vacant District 5.

Councilor Temple Lentz, who initially voted against going with the committee's map, said it is "unfortunate" the council considered that map after they voted to recuse themselves from involvement in the process the prior week.

"The process has been compromised since the beginning,

when even the past chair (of Clark County Council) started that compromise process by interfering in the selection in the redistricting committee," Lentz said.

Lentz was referring to former chair Eileen Quiring O'Brien, who resigned in March.

Lentz noted the public push-back council has received. The staff-generated map before the council had the least interference, she said.

"This is the map that we should advance and I'm disappointed that is not the motion on the floor," Lentz said.

She referred to the April 13 motion she made which led to the newest map presented. Lentz said the council ignored the part of the motion that stated adjustments could be made to the map presented at the time. Going with a prior map was not included in the motion.

"If the council moves the B2 map forward today, the council is not doing what it voted to do last week," Lentz said.

The motion at the April 19 meeting initially received a 2-1 vote, so it did not pass. Following a discussion on the next steps the council could take, and with a

looming deadline to approve the districts, Lentz reconsidered her vote.

Though she reiterated her disagreement with the decision to go with the B2 map, the protracted nature of the process led her to relent.

"Continuing to drag this out for multiple meetings where the council appears to need to consider to put their own personal preferences before the community is ridiculous," Lentz said.

The Clark County Council will have a special meeting at 8:30 a.m. on April 27 for a public hearing on map B2.




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
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A public hearing will be held on the Clark County Council's redistricting map, dubbed "B2," on April 27 before it is voted on for approval.

## Wrestlers from Battle Ground High School place at large-scale tournament

Battle Ground High School hosted a wrestling tournament on April 16 as over 500 students from multiple states came to grapple on the mat.

BGHS wrestling coach Karl Johnson was happy to see the return of a large-scale tournament after they were put on hold for two years because of the COVID-19 pandemic. Johnson is also a coach and the director of the Southwest Washington Wrestling Club.

"We're just trying to get wrestlers to be better," said Johnson. "We're rebuilding wrestling post-COVID. It's coming alive, and it's a lot of work because I really am trying to get athletes out of their houses and this depression of COVID."

Johnson said the tournament incorporated Greco-Roman and freestyle wrestling, which each had their own respective tournaments. The tournament featured eight mats with matches running concurrently.

He said the tournament was also able to raise \$16,000 through donations and concession sales, which will allow the school to purchase another mat for competitions.

"There was \$5,500 in direct donations from the community. We have people that are wanting to invest in our athletes at all levels, and so I'm dedicated now to being a manager of wrestling year-round and getting these kids out," Johnson said.

Johnson said the tournament ran smoothly, despite a few minor hiccups.

The tournament was dedicated to Merle Crockett, who Johnson said ran a similar-scale tournament at BGHS that featured "Olympic qualifiers."

"After (Crockett's) tournament, he developed health issues, so when I brought it back, ev-

erybody felt it was an endearing tournament," Johnson said.

Johnson said Merle attended the tournament that took place on April 16.

"He was very happy with what we did," he said. "(We had) wrestlers from everywhere."

For individual wrestlers, Johnson highlighted senior Gunnar Henderson, sophomore Braeden Punua, and freshman Landon Punua.

Henderson was the champion in both the Greco-Roman and freestyle brackets, while Punua placed in the top three for both events. As for Punua, he placed third as well.

"The whole thing with wrestling is you have to grow in the off-season in some way. To do that, it's about matches," Johnson said. "A lot of these guys are new to this idea of just getting matches, winning or losing. But they've bought into it now."

Johnson said practicing in the off-season may not be fun, but he noted the wrestlers are dedicated to that, which will make them better.

Johnson said he's optimistic that some of his wrestlers will place in the top three at upcoming tournaments. The Washington State Wrestling Association state tournament is set for May 7 and May 8.

Wrestlers who place at the tournament will then move onto the Fargo Junior Nationals tournament in North Dakota from July 15 to July 22.

"I think we have a lot of new wrestlers, but we have a lot who qualify and will go," Johnson said. "If they don't make it, there's other tournaments and camps in the summer we can hook them up with."

The Southwest Washington Wrestling Club runs on Mondays and Wednesdays from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. and Tuesdays from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. for new wrestlers.

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

### *Battle Ground should approve zoning changes*

Homelessness has become a crisis in towns and cities across the nation. If you talk to 100 unsheltered folk, you will hear 100 different reasons for being unsheltered. They include mental illness, addiction, loss of employment, domestic violence, etc. But, there is one underlying cause of homelessness: a lack of affordable housing and the related lack of buildable land. However, there are a couple of solutions and they are related to each other. Both require changes to current zoning laws.

One is middle housing, a transformative concept that provides a way to provide more housing and housing choice in sustainable, walkable places. These building types, such as duplexes and fourplexes provide diverse housing options and support local retail and public transportation options. Although they were common in the 1920s and 1930s, they have typically been illegal to build since the 1940s because zoning laws require single family dwellings. Middle housing helps solve the mismatch between available housing stock and growing demand.

Another solution is accessory dwelling units or ADUs, also known as in-law units. These small homes — separate from the main home — tend to be low impact and energy efficient. Where legal, they can add housing to a neighborhood, while causing less disruption than constructing new apartment buildings.

I am pleased that the Longview City Council is considering changes to its zoning codes. The board will remove the minimum requirements for the size of a lot on which a detached unit can be built. Getting rid of that requirement would more than double the number of properties that are eligible to build an ADU on and expand them into most of Longview's single-family neighborhoods. These ADUs will add to the supply of available housing, help solve a major factor of homelessness, and provide an opportunity for growth.

I have urged the Longview City Council to approve these zoning changes and I ask the City of Battle Ground to do the same.

## Child abuse prevention starts with each of us

A report of child abuse is made every 10 seconds in the United States, and child abuse and neglect cost our nation \$220 million every day in investigations, foster care placements, medical and mental health treatment, special education, juvenile and adult crime and chronic health problems across the lifespan.

The COVID-19 pandemic has negatively impacted children and families in multiple ways, including increases in housing, job and food insecurities and serious health challenges. These stressors lead to increased family violence, including more sexual abuse, more serious forms of child physical abuse, more children witnessing domestic violence and a substantial increase in online sexual exploitation of children. The Arthur D. Curtis Children's Justice Center (CJC) responded to 40% more cases in 2021 than it did in pre-pandemic 2019. But child abuse is preventable.

April is National Child Abuse Prevention Month. Child abuse impacts all cultures, races, economic statuses and communities, including ours.

Learn the signs and symptoms of child maltreatment. Report suspected abuse to child protection and law enforcement. Take steps to keep children safe. Teach them to recognize and respond to their "uh-oh" feelings. Help them identify five trusted adults to talk to when they are scared, confused or unsure. Tell them

that "secrets" are not OK in families, but that short-term surprises are. There are many ways to keep our children — and our community — safe.

This month and throughout the year, CJC encourages all individuals and organizations to play a role in making Clark County a better place for children and families. By ensuring that parents have the knowledge, skills and resources they need to care for their children, we can help prevent child abuse and neglect and make meaningful connections with children, youth and families in our communities.

Join us as we work to achieve these goals. We call upon our community members to ask youth-serving organizations what they are doing to protect children, to support caregivers during challenging times, to recognize the signs and symptoms of child maltreatment and to report suspected abuse to the authorities. There is no reason to stay silent. Your report could save a child's life.

## We need to look north to increase gas supplies

The news that President Joe Biden plans to resume leasing of federal land for oil exploration may be good five years from now, but that action alone won't bring down record gas prices at the pump in the months ahead.

According to the American Automobile Association (AAA), the national average for a gallon of regular gasoline was \$4.07 on Good Friday, which was April 15; down from \$4.31 a gallon a month ago. That's still 70% higher than when he took office.

The Interior Department announced it will put up 144,000 acres of government land for auction. In exchange, the president wants higher royalties on federal land oil production. It increases by six points — 12.5% to 18.75%.

U.S. Oil & Gas Association President Tim Stewart told Fox News the new policy will compound the problem. We have a short-term production shortfall right now. Additional leasing will push this problem out three, five, seven, 10 years.

The president continues to avoid more immediate remedies.

One is reversing his order which killed the Keystone XL pipeline. It alone would dramatically increase deliveries of crude from Canada and the Bakken fields in North Dakota and Montana to Midwest and Gulf of Mexico refineries. The unfinished pipeline would be 875 miles and have the capacity to transport 830,000 barrels per day.

Another solution closer to home is to increase Alaska oil and natural gas production and send more domestic crude to West Coast refineries.

According to Sightline Institute, the five oil refineries on Puget Sound provide almost all of Oregon and Washington gasoline, diesel and jet fuel. In 2021, before Russia invaded Ukraine, our state's refineries imported 10 million barrels of Russian crude.

Last June, Biden suspended oil and gas leases in Alaska's Arctic National Wildlife Refuge (ANWR). It is one of America's single greatest prospects for future domestic oil production. In 2002, estimates stated it contained from 10 billion to 17 billion barrels of recoverable oil — enough to replace 58 years of Iraqi oil imports.

ANWR is 19.6 million acres of frozen tundra, which is larger than the states of Massachusetts, New Jersey, Hawaii, Connecticut and Delaware combined. Oil exploration would occur on less than 2,000 acres of land which would be like a small dot on an 8 inch by 10 inch sheet of paper.

On Alaska's North Slope, drilling takes place during the winter over roads built on sheets of ice. When the ice melts, the roads disappear. The production pads are different from traditional oil derricks spread across Oklahoma, Texas and southern California.

Prudhoe Bay is proof that we can safely produce Alaskan oil. In the intervening years, drilling technology has greatly improved, with environmentally-friendly units able to drill dozens of underground wells for miles from one small pad only a few

acres in size.

Admittedly, the nation's largest oil spill was in Alaska's Prince William Sound in March 1989 when the Exxon Valdez strayed off course and struck a reef. America must ensure that accidents, whether they be oil spills from domestic or foreign tankers or fires from overheated lithium batteries, do not happen.

The bottom line is our country requires lots of energy and needs diversity which includes carbon fuels. All sources must have the best proven pollution control and safety technology.

President Biden needs to lower the cost of gas for transportation and natural gas for heating, cooking and industrial production. He needs to act in ways that make a difference in the months ahead.

Simply drawing down our strategic oil reserves or pandering to foreign oil producers who are unfriendly, creates a bigger problem rather than a domestic practical solution. For Washington, looking north to Alaska and Canada is a much better solution than buying from Russia.

city a possibility.

“Now we’re making Woodland our home, and not just a stop ... in the middle of our journey,” Doughty said.

Most of Doughty’s prior community decision-making experience has been in committees in the Meriwether neighborhood, she said. She said the idea to run in the 2021 election crossed her mind, but the time to file had passed.

“This is kind of my real first push to get

actively involved, I would say, beyond just little things here and there,” Doughty said.

Acknowledging growth in the city is inevitable, she wants to make sure the council is “growing Woodland in the right way and making sure it’s done to still be a town I’m proud of.”

Doughty wants to make sure the city works with developers and businesses. She wants the council to ensure “they’re here for the community and not just for a dollar.”

“I’ve moved my whole life, and so to kind of finally have somewhere I can say I don’t think I have to leave is really nice for a change,” Doughty said.

She said she wants to be an “ambassador” for younger families in the city so they have “buy-in” on decision-making. Doughty wants to build community relationships so people feel heard.

“As we have more and more people move in from outside of Woodland, it’s important to make them feel a part of the community and not as an outsider, so that they want to continue to stay,” Doughty said.

After deliberating in an executive session, councilors voted to appoint Doughty. Several councilors said the candidate pool made the decision especially difficult.

“It’s unusual that we have such

good-quality people to show up to apply to the city council position,” Councilor Carol Rounds said.

Councilor Monte Smith said choosing one applicant over the other was “soul-sucking.”

“It is a very, very hard decision,” Smith said.

Councilor DeeAnna Holland encouraged those who were not appointed to seek elected office the next time a position came to the end of a term.

“The best way you can be a part of the conversation is to be here making decisions,” Holland said.

of Northeast 179th Street and Northeast 15th Avenue in Ridgefield after receiving reports from loggers who spotted a body as they arrived for work.

Huggins’ body was badly beaten and he appeared to have been tortured prior to his death, the release stated.

Huggins was stripped of his club membership for allegedly stealing from the club, the Justice Department stated. According to indictment documents, Huggins told a member of the club that he owed the club \$5,000 and was badly beaten by club associates.

Huggins broke into Dencklau’s Woodburn residence, tied up Dencklau’s girlfriend and stole multiple firearms, the Jus-

tice Department stated, after which Dencklau directed club members to find Huggins.

According to trial witnesses, on June 30, 2015, Dencklau and others kidnapped Huggins from Portland and transported him to a rural property in Southwest Washington. An indictment stated the property was near Woodland.

Huggins was severely beaten and tortured over the course of several hours, sustaining injuries that included a fractured skull, lacerations to his chest and torso, and his nipples were removed, according to the Justice Department. His death was ruled to be caused by multiple blunt force and sharp injuries.

In 2018, Dencklau and Erickson received federal grand jury indictments alongside others in connection with the murder. Those indicted included Earl

Deverle Fisher, 48, of Gresham; Tiler Evan Pribbernow, 40, of Portland; Kenneth Earl Hause, 64, of Aumsville, Oregon; Ryan Anthony Negrinelli, 36, of Gresham; and Joseph Duane Folkerts, 61, of Battle Ground.

Scott Erik Asphaug, the U.S. Attorney for the District of Oregon, acknowledged the sentences were years in the making, adding Dencklau and Erickson “will rightfully serve the rest of their lives in federal prison.”

“These men prided themselves in using violence to intimidate others and increase their power and influence among club mem-

bers and rivals,” Asphaug said.

Both Asphaug and ATF Seattle Field Division Special Agent in Charge Jonathan T. McPherson announced the sentences.

In December, the federal jury who convicted Dencklau and Erickson acquitted Erickson and Hause, the Gypsy Jokers national president, of racketeering conspiracy, the Justice Department noted. On April 12, Pribbernow was sentenced to more than 11 years in federal prison following a guilty plea. Fisher, Negrinelli, and Folkerts have also pleaded guilty and are awaiting sentencing.

Investigation into the case was supported by a number of agencies including the Portland Police Bureau and ATF, with assistance from the U.S. Marshals Service, IRS-Criminal Investigation, the Clark County Sheriff’s Office, Oregon State Police, and the Oregon and Washington State crime labs.

The case was brought as part of the Justice Department’s Project Safe Neighborhoods program, the release stated. Prosecution is the result of an investigation by the department’s Organized Crime Drug Enforcement Task Force.

at Evergreen Boulevard would lead to fewer property impacts. Ending there would also allow connectivity to Library Square at the corner of C Street and Evergreen Boulevard and at nearby city-owned parcels once they are developed.

The difference between the two options under consideration are the number of auxiliary lanes at interchanges in the project area. IBRP Administrator Greg Johnson said following April 21’s meetings that project staff would take comment from the different steering and advisory groups before coming up with the preferred scenario on May 5.

He said the final endorsement from the executive steering and bi-state groups would come in mid-July. The option would be studied in depth for federal environmental review. The program’s current target would have a draft review ready in early 2023 for public input.

Though Johnson stressed a final decision has yet to be made, joint committee member Sen. Lynda Wilson, R-Vancouver, felt “the train has left the station” with the current focus on light rail as the rapid transit solution.

“I feel like we’ve had these discussions, but most of the discussions and decisions have been made not here at this group,” Wilson said about the process.

Following April 21’s meetings, U.S. Rep. Jaime Herrera Beutler criticized the decision to only look at light rail as an option. Herrera Beutler said the current replacement project has too closely reflected the CRC project, specifically on its insistence on light rail.

“This decision flies in the face of Southwest Washington voters who have soundly and repeatedly rejected bringing Portland’s light rail to Washington state along with the massive cost, river traffic limitations and public safety concerns that come with it,” Herrera Beutler, R-Battle Ground, said in a statement.



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# Battle Ground High School students place in welding contest

Three students from Battle Ground High School competed at the Charter College Welding Contest in Vancouver on April 15, securing spots in the top five.

Junior Jacob Dickey took second place in the competition and won a \$5,000 scholarship, while senior Justin Tamez placed third and won a \$3,000 scholarship. Senior Thomas Sauser secured fifth place.

“They did really good,” said welding instructor Tod Garred. “They were all pretty much first-year welding students. I’ve only had Jacob for a semester and he’s doing really well. It’s the others’ first year and they’re doing well too.”

The students were evaluated on a written exam, welding fitting, shielded metal arc welding, and gas metal arc welding.

Garred said the written exam was based on materials put together by the American Welding

Society. It focused on topics like identifying different types of welds, measurements, and general welding theory. The fitting portion involved fitting metal together and matching it to specifications on a drawing, as well as joining configurations of the metal, he said.

Garred said shielded metal welding is an old-fashioned procedure where the arc needs to be struck and positioned correctly, while gas metal arc welding is based on a wire feed.

During those events, the students had to create a multitude of joint configurations on the metal they were working with.

“This was all one big piece that they put together with different pieces of metal. On the drawing, there were areas they weren’t supposed to weld, so they had to know how to read the symbols in order to know where to weld,” Garred said.

He said the students had to

play catch up, since they weren’t able to participate in welding at the school for two years because of the pandemic.

As the students worked from home, Garred said they focused on the theory of welding.

“(With theory), we teach welding symbols and different gasses we might use, types of welding rods, and different metals and how to treat them,” Garred said.

Among their prizes, Dickey and Tamez won welding hoods, which are used to protect their faces in the welding process, tape measures, and other tools

of the trade.

According to Garred, this was the first time Charter College hosted the welding contest. In the past, the class competed in the SkillsUSA welding and metal fabrication championships, which was also on pause for two years because of the pandemic.

The class was able to compete in the national championship by SkillsUSA in 2015 and 2016, where they won the regional and state contests.

“(The national championship) went well. It was tough for them, but they did it,” Garred said. “It

was an eye-opener for them.”

At the previous SkillsUSA National Championship, Garred said the team competed in the metal fabrication competition, where they created a smoker out of welded metal. The students drew the plan themselves based on the materials they were given.

“It’s a very difficult contest. Not a lot of people could do it,” Garred said.

Junior Thomas Fallon from Prairie High School placed first in the Charter College Welding Contest and Lucas Lyle took fourth place.

Patrick "Paddy" Hough was an Irish immigrant who moved to British Columbia and later Vancouver after he survived the potato famine in his country.

Hough, who lived from 1846 to 1925, was an agricultural teacher in Vancouver.

Hough's will stipulated that his estate, which was worth \$35,000, needed to be used to establish an agricultural high school in the county. While a high school was never constructed, Hough's dream was realized in the form of the Center for Agriculture, Science and Environmental Education, otherwise known as CASEE.

"(Hough) was the principal of Vancouver's only high school at the time in the late 1800s and he was really a pioneer in establishing schools in Southwest Washington," said Battle Ground School Board President Mark Watrin. "He extended that past his actual living time by creating endowments that went beyond his lifetime."

Watrin said Hough sold his furniture and other belongings before he died to arrange an endowment in the hopes of building a school for "the education of all," which included women, ethnic minorities, and religious minorities, something that was uncommon at the time.

"That money was almost forgotten for almost 60 years, and the amount of interest and everything that built up by the time it was eventually distributed became a very significant amount," Watrin said.

Over time, Hough's endowment grew to over \$2 million.

This year, the Patrick Hough Endowment Fund donated \$103,807 to support CASEE's 80-acre outdoor learning lab, as well as the Battle Ground and Prairie programs.

Watrin noted Hough is an important historical figure because

he was a "passionate educator."

"I love the idea of somebody not only having a passion about what they did, but then to do what seemed like a simple thing such as selling his belongings, he put it toward this dream of something better than what was already available in his lifetime," Watrin said. "To me, it's just fascinating that he had this foresight that 'if I just make this small contribution in the long run, it's going to be a much bigger contribution.'"

Aside from being charitable, Watrin said Hough was a "true believer in technology." For example, CASEE uses biotechnology to further agricultural science, which is something Hough mentioned in his writings.

Hough wanted the agricultural school he envisioned to be named after his hometown of Slevoir, Ireland, but Watrin said that didn't happen because the program had already been established under a different name.

"We had this vague history of how Patrick Hough was involved, but we didn't get the specific texts of his endowment until later," Watrin said. "We made sure that we named the arboretum that was created at CASEE for public use the Slevoir Arboretum to make sure

we honored his original request that part of the school be named after his original hometown."

Cindy Arnold, the director of Career and Technical Education for Battle Ground Public Schools, said Hough wanted students to learn skills so they could go into the agricultural field.

"He had a heart for agriculture and students, so I think in his later years, he was just being very cautious with his money and just put it away," said Arnold. "We are a strong agricultural district, and we've been able to benefit from that (endowment) money for quite a few years, and it has done amazing things for our program and our students. I think the fact that he had that heart for agriculture and for students and left his money for that, I want to make sure I honor his wishes the best I can as a director."

She explained the money received from the endowment fund is split between CASEE and the agriculture programs at Battle Ground and Prairie high schools.

"At BGHS, Deanna Veitenheimer, the horticulture teacher, has what she calls 'Paddy's Garden' just outside of the greenhouses in honor of Paddy Hough and the money that's been given to the school," Arnold said.

All Season Plants in Ridgefield works hard year-round to provide wholesale plants to the residents of Clark County.

Owner Rue Lindgren originally started the nursery online before she moved into the property at 21000 NW 39th Ave.

“It started out as gifts, decor and plants, and we built a database that allowed us to see what inventory was out there in Willamette Valley,” said Lindgren. “It allowed us to be pretty competitive and organized on other projects. We realized the garden center stuff was very much a different job, a whole different business.”

Lindgren transitioned her business from online to a warehouse, but that environment proved to be difficult for the plants. Shipping was also a hassle, she said, since there was a lot of waste that accumulated from trying to transport plants, so Lindgren looked for a different location.

Lindgren opened All Season Plants at its current location in 2015. The property originally belonged to Phil and Linda Luke, who own the South Ridge Growers Nursery.

Prior to starting the nursery, Lindgren worked in real estate with her father. She took on a project and found out she “enjoyed the plant portion of it.”

Her parents originally started the nursery together, but when her dad died, Lindgren bought half of the business, while her mother gave her the other half.

“I love (the nursery),” she said. “It’s my favorite thing to do.”

Her cousin-in-law, Andrew Sharp, also works at the nursery. Sharp studied crop science in college and is known for his expertise in horticulture. Before the nursery, he worked in golf course management.

“Plants are more interesting than grass,” Sharp said with a laugh.

All Season Plants offers a variety of items like shrubs, perennials and trees. Lindgren said the native plants are the most popular. Those include vaccinium, huckleberry, heuchera, fine maple, and deer fern, which all have a section of their own at the nursery.

In February 2021, a large snowstorm hit the county and impacted All Season.

“We’re in the process of a remodel,” Lindgren said. “Last year, we got hit by the winter storm that dumped about two feet out here. It collapsed about 37 of our greenhouses, so we’ve been in rebuild mode all year. We have five more houses left (to build).”

To avoid future incidents, Lindgren chose a taller design for the new greenhouses, which are meant to withstand heavier loads of snow. They were originally 20 feet tall, but are now 30 feet. The property features 2 acres with an area that goes downhill, so Lindgren decided to use the upper section to showcase their plants, while the lower section serves as a production area for growing.

All Season plans to open the upstairs portion of the building so it can be used for retail, since there’s been a higher demand because of an uptick of new homes in Ridgefield.

Lindgren said All Season stands out from the competition because of their friendly service.

“We (also) have a big variety of plants because it’s such a huge area,” she said. “I think people like to walk through the production area too. It’s fun to see.”

Since the nursery mainly sells wholesale items, she said they have competitive pricing as well.

All Season Plants is open from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. The business is closed on weekends.

**Washington Firewood Law**

State law requires firewood to be sold by the cord or fraction of a cord. A cord is 128 cubic feet, which is a stack 4 feet wide, 4 feet tall, and 8 feet long; or equivalent. A cord of wood cut 16 inches long would be three stacks 4 feet tall and 8 feet long.

The terms "rack," "unit," "pile," and "truckload" are not to be used when advertising firewood. State law requires that a delivery ticket or sales invoice be presented by the seller to the purchaser at the time of sale. The sales invoice is to include the name and address of the seller, name and address of buyer, quantity delivered, price, and date of delivery. State law suggests that firewood be described for sale by species such as 50 percent oak and 50 percent alder.
