The Battle Ground High School Class of 2022 celebrated the end of their high school careers in a downpour during the school's graduation ceremony on June 10 at the district's football stadium.

The school's Air Force JROTC presented the color guard before Danika Schnell of the BGHS chorus sang the National Anthem. Principal Charbonneau Gourde introduced senior class president Madison Jolma with the commencement's first speech.

"Through all we have dealt with during our time here at

BGHS, we have learned some crucial life lessons and done a lot of growing up," Jolma said. "I hope that as you move forward into whatever the future holds for you, you're able to remember the lessons you have learned, but I also hope you make mistakes and I hope you make a lot of them. We're all still so young. Now is the time to make mistakes, to fall in love a lot, to be impulsive, take risks, and bet against the odds, because we won't always have the chance to live like this."

Jolma emphasized how unpredictable the future can be, but gave her classmates reassurance by reminding them Battle Ground will always be there for the students to return to.

"I'm thankful to have been a part of this class. There's no other group of people I'd rather spend my childhood with," she said.

After a rendition of "For Good" from the musical "Wicked" was performed, valedictorian Makayla Loose offered some words to the audience.

"We did not have a single normal year of high school," Loose said. "We dealt with teacher strikes, Zoom classes, and even learned something new: social distancing. We have overcome challenges that no one could have prepared us for, but extra disinfectant and masks weren't the only adjustment we made. We worked around all of these

setbacks and still made it here to graduate today."

Loose's speech highlighted the resilience displayed by the class and their willingness to overcome adversity, despite the odds they faced since the COVID-19 pandemic began.

"We worked so hard, and if we can make it through a pandemic that shut down the entire globe, we can definitely handle the new and amazing chapter of our lives," she said.

Valedictorian Karleigh Potter offered a different angle to her speech, which took inspiration from Taylor Swift's commencement speech at New York

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# County animal control cracks down on cruelty cases

Clark County Animal Protection and Control has ramped up its efforts to handle cruelty and neglect cases across the county as the department's new manager and staff seek to repair a reputation of inaction.

Since July, the department has executed six search warrants on properties in Clark County on potential neglect and cruelty cases, turning up more than 100 animals in need of care. Cases have ranged from an apartment in Vancouver to rural properties in North Clark County, and animals of all sizes including reptiles, horses and livestock.

In November, animal control seized 44 birds of various species on a property near Ridgefield due to unsanitary conditions and a lack of food and water, a release from the county stated. A few months later, the department removed 20 cows from a Battle Ground-area property, two of which had to be euthanized. That case resulted in first-degree animal cruelty charges for the property owner.

Most recently, animal control responded to a property in La Center to remove three emaciated horses, the release stated.

The increased enforcement activity is part of Clark County Animal Protection and Control Manager Joanne Cloud's plan to reverse a preconception that the department won't help out.

"People's perception was you can call animal control but they

won't respond," Cloud said.

Currently the department has Cloud, an administrative position, a dispatcher and three officers. Cloud said the department is authorized to have up to five officers, and is working on filling the vacancies.

Cloud's position is her first foray into professional animal control, though she has a background working with animals. Before serving active duty in the U.S. Coast Guard for 20 years, Cloud worked as a veterinary technician. That background proved beneficial for volunteering during her military tenure.

"Depending on where I was stationed, I either volunteered at a humane society or a vet clinic and just kept those skills up," Cloud said.

Cloud was promoted to master chief petty officer right before landing at the county, so she decided to stick around for a few years in the Coast Guard reserves while taking on the county role.

## Forging partnerships

When Cloud joined the department in July she said establishing partnerships was her first concern. Although the Humane Society for Southwest Washington could house cats, dogs and small animals, animal control had to look elsewhere for livestock and equine cases.

To meet that need, animal control formed a partnership with Ridgefield-based Rocking B Farms. Cloud said the farm has gone above and beyond in helping the department. In one case, they took in dozens of cows in the middle of the night.

"They were ready for us," Cloud said. "They had room."

Since she started in July to the end of May, 93 animals have gone through the farm, Cloud said.

The department has also partnered with Sound Equine Options in Troutdale. Cloud said the rescue has received eight horses from cases in the past two months.

Support from Rocking B and Sound Equine Options for large animals complements the existing "amazing" resource of the humane society, Cloud said.

Animal control officers are trained for their specific duties and are not armed law enforcement or trained to handle mental health crises.

"Some of these calls, they're bad. Maybe it's a domestic dispute, maybe it's a mental health thing and someone's hoarding

animals," Cloud said.

She recalled one case where a resident decided to shoot cats in a neighborhood.

"When those things happen, we end up having to take a step back because we have to wait for the police to respond with us. If they're busy on a drug bust or a murder or something else, we have to wait. It's not safe," Cloud said.

Cloud said when she arrived at the county, the department had not done a search warrant in almost two decades.

"I don't think it was for a lack of caring," Cloud said, reasoning her predecessors weren't aware of the procedures.

The department has since partnered with the sheriff's office who helps animal control draft probable cause documents and execute warrants, Cloud said. Animal control started to work with sheriff's Sgt. Brian Kessel and his unit for the sheriff's office for support on warrants. The most recent one saw support from the Vancouver Police Department, whose procedures are similar to the sheriff's office so animal control already knew how to work with them.

"Learning how the sheriff wanted things done and making that partnership, without them we just couldn't do it," Cloud said.

She thanked Kessel for helping with the more intensive work that is now showing results.

Animal control's jurisdiction covers Vancouver, Yacolt and unincorporated Clark County. Battle Ground, La Center and Ridgefield have to rely on their own police for animal issues, though Cloud said she wants to be able to

help those departments whenever she can.

"My take was just, we should help each other," Cloud said.

## Putting procedures in place

Another push for Cloud is to have standard operating procedures in place. Some of those procedures are based on guidelines from the National Animal Control Association, she said.

"The only way to rebuild that reputation in the community is to give really good customer service," Cloud said.

Cloud estimated animal control gets about 60 calls a day. Due to the small staff the department has to triage calls, with cases of cruelty and neglect alongside vicious animals taking top priority.

Those in animal control's jurisdiction with animal-related concerns can call 564-397-2488, or after-hours at 360-839-3850. Cloud said animal control has worked out an agreement with Pacific Northwest Pet ER for support on after-hours emergency cases.

Some of the lingering preconceptions of the department have made their way to social media, which Cloud has found particularly irksome since it doesn't help solve problems, whether those are current issues or were under the former administration of animal control.

"I would so rather hear from a citizen that they're dissatisfied with something versus reading about it later because someone copied me on a social media post," Cloud said.

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# Battle Ground Rose Float participates in Portland's Grand Floral Parade

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Volunteers spent months crafting the Battle Ground Rose Float, which was included in the Grand Floral Parade in Portland on June 11.

Volunteer Barbara Rowe was excited to unveil the float.

"The Portland parade's theme is 'Rose City Reunion' because of course we've been without a Rose Parade for two years," Rowe said. "The last one was in 2019, and the theme for the Battle Ground float is royal rendezvous because it's a reunion of past princesses of Battle Ground royalty."

She said the float also contains past critters that were featured on previous floats, like bees, bluebirds, owls, and snakes. Rowe said the construction crew who built the float decided to downsize this year to a 9 foot by 27 foot float. In the past, the float was 35 feet by 12 feet.

"We made it a little smaller hoping we can fit it into an existing building or somebody's garage. We're building it in a barn off of 132nd Avenue," she said.

Princesses from past parades who represent Battle Ground also attended the parade.

"For (the princesses), this will be a treat because they'll get to ride on the float. Last time, they had to walk the route and it was twice as long as it is this year," Rowe said.

The princesses are girls who

attend or have attended Battle Ground Public Schools.

Rowe said the building process was unusual this year due to the unpredictability of the COVID-19 pandemic. They began construction on the float in January.

"We didn't know for some time that there was even going to be a parade this year," she said. "We had to find out for sure that there was going to be a parade, and we didn't find out until the end of last year, so we lost a few months there (to build the float). Because our construction team wanted to tear it down to a workable size, they have been working on it and making it smaller to try and improve on the chase design. They ended up working on it a lot longer than they intended."

Rowe added that the decorating crew didn't get to work on it until the beginning of May.

"Fortunately, we had another place where some of us could work on certain aspects of the float," Rowe said. "We're a rather close-knit group because we've done this for many years. One of our people has done it for over 30 years. ... I've only done it for 17."

Part of the float is made of foam panels that the Battle Ground Rose Float group would have used to craft its float in 2020, although plans for that one were canceled due to the pandemic. Rowe said the panels are made to look like brick walls. The float also included a cab on

top with a lattice that was made of wheat bran and flaxseed.

She said the Grand Floral Parade celebrates the Pacific Northwest and its communities.

"Battle Ground has contributed a float as the only all volunteer made float representing the community. There's a lot of floats from commercial entities, but there are also others from communities," Rowe said.

Battle Ground Rose Float has operated since 1955.

## Battle Ground man charged with insurance fraud

A Battle Ground man was one of three people recently charged with automotive insurance fraud in Washington following investigations by the state insurance commissioner's criminal investigation unit.

On June 7, the office of Washington State Insurance Commissioner Mike Kreidler announced the charges. Among them, Pavel Kovalev, of Battle Ground, was charged by the Clark County Prosecutor's Office for false claims or proof and second-degree attempted theft.

According to the office's announcement, Kovalev was involved in a two-vehicle collision in April 2019 when he did not have insurance. Kovalev called Progressive to add his vehicle to an existing policy after the accident, not telling the insurance provider what had just happened. Progressive later discovered Clark County Sheriff's Office deputies responded to the scene about a half hour before the call,

proving a lack of insurance at the time of the accident.


Progressive denied Kovalev's claim for \$3,730 and referred the claim to the criminal investigation unit, the release stated.

Other claims included in the release focused on a San Juan

County case where an individual reported vehicle damage of more than \$6,000 that existed before they purchased the vehicle, and a case in Spokane County where the insurance company learned through another involved driver that an individual reinstated a

policy after a collision, denying a claim of about \$12,500.

Insurance fraud costs the average family \$400 to \$700 per year in increased premiums, the release stated. Insurance companies are required by law to report fraud to the commissioner.

## Woodland moves forward on 'fee holiday' for new commercial, industrial development

New businesses in Woodland may get a reprieve from part of what they pay to build new de-

velopments as the city council passed the first reading of a two-year "holiday" from transportation impact fees.

During its June 6 meeting, the Woodland City Council voted

4-2 to approve the first reading of an ordinance establishing the fee holiday. If the final reading is approved at the council's June 20 meeting, the ordinance would exempt the collection of transportation impact fees for commercial and industrial development projects through June 30, 2024.

The fee holiday was the culmination of work Woodland Mayor

Will Finn has done with the existing business community as a way to expand the city's commercial and industrial base, the mayor said at the meeting.

"I feel like my job is to spur development and to get folks in here to create jobs," Finn said.

He said it's been a project of his since he first assumed mayoral duties in 2016.

"I think we've finally got to a compromise," Finn said.

Transportation impact fees are one of a variety of fees developers pay on new construction. Others include fees to offset impacts on fire protection and schools, as well as parks and recreation.

The fees are a one-time payment that have to go to specific uses. In the case of transportation impact fees, they must be used on streets and roads, according to the Municipal Research and Services Center.

The money collected from the impact fees varies based on what projects are underway. The fees paid for commercial and industrial development is based on use and square footage, according to the city fee schedule. For 2022, the city budgeted \$30,000 from transportation impact fees, lower than the \$75,000 budgeted in 2021, according to city budget documents.

Public Works Director Tracy Coleman said the holiday won't have an affect on what her department has planned in the near term. Coleman said the city already has "millions of dollars" from grants coming in for those projects.

"If you're going to do (the holiday), this would be the time," Coleman said.

Councilor Carol Rounds was one of four to vote for the approval of the measure.

"With all the work we've done to try to get the port area up and running ... when you get more jobs in the community, it's a good thing," Rounds said.

She added incentivizing more development may benefit the city's ability to get state funding as it could make Woodland's current traffic issues more of a priority.

"It may get a little worse before it gets better," Rounds said.

Rounds was joined by councilors Karl Chapman, Jenn Rowland and DeeAnna Holland in supporting the measure, while councilors Melissa Doughty and J.J. Burke voted against it. Councilor Monte Smith was absent.

Burke said he isn't in favor of skipping out on revenue that could be used for road infrastructure.

"I feel like this is going to cost us in the long run," Burke said.

Doughty said bringing in more business to the city would bring more traffic.

"Right now, I know traffic is a huge issue," Doughty said.

She noted it's not only an issue at the interstate interchange but also within the city itself. She pointed to the confluence of Walmart, Woodland High School and the city's industrial area to the south as particularly congested during peak hours.

"When (the industrial area is) getting out of work, school's getting out and people are shopping. It's a nightmare," Doughty said.

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# Barbecue competition to be held at ilani

Chefs Rick Browne and Lynnae Oxley will host a barbecue food contest at ilani in Ridgefield on June 25 and 26.

Having worked with some of the world's greatest chefs like Julia Child and Giuliano Bugialli, Browne is excited to see what local barbecue enthusiasts are ready to cook up in the upcoming competition as they face off with seasoned veterans. Browne, who is known as the "guru of barbecue," originally hosted a smaller competition at Overlook Park years ago and wanted to make the event larger.

"I expressed interest in doing a bigger competition one day, and (ilani) called me about four months ago and said 'we're thinking of doing another barbecue contest. Can you help us set it up?' I said, 'I'd be delighted to,'" Browne said. "Since then, I've been working on setting it up, inviting barbecue teams from around the area and setting up what we would do as prize money, what foods we'd compete with, and talk to them about getting judges. It's taken a couple months, we're getting down to the wire, and we're going to have a really successful and interesting barbecue competition."

Browne said some of the judges at the competition include well known chefs like Alton Brown, Robert Irvine, Todd English and Kevin Bludso. Despite the notable personalities who will be in attendance, Browne said the event is geared toward local participation.

"The main thing I wanted in this contest was I didn't want it to just be ordinary barbecue circuit guys who travel around the West

going to these barbecue competitions. I wanted to make sure it was open to everybody," Browne said. "Therefore, we're doing four different items than they do at these other contests. We're doing pork bellies, baby back beef ribs, we're doing salmon, and we're doing a whole chicken."

He explained at past events he's seen people make chicken which usually comes in "six perfectly done" pieces. Since it's harder to cook a whole chicken rather than individual parts, Browne wants to give contestants an extra challenge.

At the competition, Browne said people should expect to have fun. They will have the ability to talk to and share recipes with various chefs.

"Barbecue folks are pretty open about sharing their recipes for rubs and sauces," he said.

There's also a total of \$15,000 in cash prizes, with a grand prize of \$5,000, a top prize in each of the four food categories worth \$1,000 each, a second prize of \$500, and a third prize of \$250.

The entry fee is \$50 and Browne encourages more people to sign up and show off their barbecue skills. Pork bellies and beef baby back ribs will be judged on Saturday, June 25, while the salmon and chicken will be judged on Sunday, June 26. There will also be food trucks at the event, he said.

For contestants, people have the freedom to cook in whatever style works best for them, whether it be on a large smoker or a Weber grill.

"I've seen people at the top barbecue events in the country using simple barbecues like the Weber kettle top, so I want to encourage people to come out and give it a shot," he said.

Throughout his career, Browne has wrote 16 barbecue cookbooks and hosted the public TV show "Barbecue America" from 2003 to 2009. He also hosted the show "Ready Aim Grill" on the Outdoor Channel for one season.

Browne is one of a few people in the country to have an honorary doctorate of barbecue philosophy degree, which he received from the Kansas City Barbecue Society. Since then, he has been a barbecue consultant around the

country. He has made appearances on Good Morning America, Regis & Kelly, The Today Show, and other news shows as well.

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## Hostage Situation Soon to End

Proselytizing has never been looked upon with any great favor. Today, church members are held hostage as greedy administrators delve into practices of big business enriching self as truths take back seat in the ministry. "Then answered the Jews and said unto him, what sign shewest thou unto us, seeing that thou dost these things" (V.18). Jesus cuts to the chase "and said unto them, destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up" (v.19). On the cross the church appeared as about to fall as "the vail of the temple was rent in the midst" (Luke 23:45). In the midst of the evening sacrifice the vail separating the holy from the most holy was torn from top to bottom signifying this form of church worship had come to an end, reflecting the words of Jesus as He hung dying on the cross, "It is finished" (John 19:30). God demonstrates His sovereign power in areas man tries his best to control. Ultimately the temple or body of Jesus was destroyed, but "know assuredly, that God hath made that same Jesus, whom ye have crucified, both Lord and Christ" (Acts 2:36). As the body of Jesus experienced life after three days, so too did His church. The death of Jesus alone could not have accomplished this. The proselytizing of a few that still had faith in Him would not have been enough to establish what was needed to continue what Jesus carried on His shoulders triumphantly to the cross.

If this was the message of today's church, it would create in them that temple Jesus brought to life after three days, setting the people on the path to faithfully practice God's moral law, ending the corporate investing in many churches. The Holy Spirit that "suddenly... came... from heaven as of a rushing mighty wind" (v.2) would give unity of purpose with power as it was in Jesus that couldn't be denied. The church going through won't be invested in the corporate bottom line. All business models including faith-based investing will end. Prior to Christ return, the hostage situation in popular churches will become known.

# Clark County parks gets to work on north county projects

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The parks and lands division of Clark County Public Works is gearing up to tackle projects this summer that would bring a community park and a disc golf course to the county by the end of the year.

On Monday, June 6, construction began for the Kozy Kamp Neighborhood Park, a release from the county stated. The park is located at 17410 NE 29th Ave., south of Northeast 179th Street in the county's Fairgrounds Neighborhood.


When completed, the park will feature a playground, a multi-sport court, a paved loop trail, an open lawn play area, picnic tables and benches. Other improvements will also be made along the park boundary by Northeast 29th Avenue.

The county estimates the project will be completed by the end of September. It is expected to cost \$1.5 million, paid out of park impact fees and real estate excise taxes the county collects.

As a neighborhood park, Kozy Kamp will not include parking or restrooms, as it is intended to be for those who live within a half-mile of the park, a county FAQ explained.

The project has been years in the making, as the first rumblings of the project began with a newsletter in 2009, according to the county website. The name "Kozy Kamp" was chosen by a poll of neighborhood voters, and references an old motor camp and rest area located near what is now the 179th Street interchange with Interstate 5 to the west of the park.

Work also began last month on an 18-hole disc golf course at Hockinson Meadows Community Park. The project will feature a

mile of hard and soft trails, a 50-foot bridge that connects the trails and course to the rest of the park, and a 225-square-foot shelter.

The course will be built on 40 acres at 10910 NE 172nd Ave., Vancouver, which is separated from the rest of the park by a stream. Significant field work is expected to start later this month pending the arrival of building materials, a county release stated.

The course's design meets Professional Disc Golf Association standards. Each hole includes a tee pad, hole marker, basket and bench. The trails will connect to the park's existing system.

Like the Kozy Kamp park, the Hockinson Meadows disc golf

course is expected to be completed by the end of September. The work may occasionally impact those who use the adjacent playground, the county noted.

The project is expected to cost about \$455,000 and will be funded through real estate excise taxes and park impact fees. Disc golf enthusiasts also raised \$3,500 through the Parks Foundation of Clark County to support the project, the county noted.

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# Lawsuit against county redistricting hits setback

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A former member of a committee tasked with drawing new boundaries for the Clark County Council's districts has sued the county, alleging it violated state law during its process after the council approved a map after months of deliberation.

Janet Landesberg, one of two Democratic Party members of the Clark County Redistricting Committee, filed a suit in Clark County Superior Court on May 11, arguing a number of violations. Several are focused on alleged bias on behalf of the council as they considered district boundaries.

Chief among the suit's arguments is that the council took into account the residences of current councilors when a new map was crafted in order to keep them in their respective district.

The suit also alleges the council violated state law by breaking up several neighborhood associations into multiple districts. It claims the council violated the Clark County Charter by interfering with executive operations when the map was changed after the county auditor's office sent out notifications to residents who would be affected by an initial change approved by voters in November.

Landesberg was one of five members of the redistricting committee that did not vote with a four-fifths majority on a map by the end of 2021. The committee forwarded maps that were under consideration to the council, starting a monthlong process to determine the district borders by those it would affect.

One of the lawsuit's claims, stating the decision made after Dec. 31, 2021 was a violation of state law, has been thrown out. On May 26, Superior Court

Judge David Gregerson ruled the county's charter superseded state law with regard to the redistricting process.

Landesberg said during the redistricting process county staff and legal counsel said they were using what was laid out in state law to redraw the maps. She filed the lawsuit based on what was in state law, only for attorneys representing Clark County in her lawsuit, from an outside firm from Seattle, to argue it wasn't applicable.

Landesberg's suit was filed the day the county council approved a redistricting map with a 3-1 vote. The map was based on one that was initially drafted during the redistricting committee's work but did not get a majority of support from the committee.

Councilor Richard "Dick" Rylander, who was recently appointed at the time of the vote, was the one to suggest the map.


Though he ruled on whether or not the Dec. 31 deadline was applicable, Gregerson did not rule on the other arguments, which keeps the suit alive. Any ruling on the other parts won't affect elections this year, which include three of the five county council seats, Landesberg acknowledged.

"I can't change what's going to happen in the county for the next 10 years. ... Those lines are drawn," Landesberg said.

She added any effect from a change brought on by the suit would disenfranchise individuals who might have run before the changes were made.

Even with the May 26 setback, Landesberg has not dropped the lawsuit. She said she will push for a discovery process that will require the parties in the suit to turn over documents pertinent to the case.

She said that process may

bring to light allegations that the political parties involved with appointing members of the committee had different standards for the selection of a map. The process may turn up actions or discussion during the process from council chair Karen Bowerman and councilor Gary Medvigy, who will be up for election

in 2024.

Landesberg said the issue with deadlines could be resolved at the state level to make the process clearer.

"It would be a whole lot easier if I could get the Legislature to clear it up, then to have to create a charter amendment," Landesberg said.

Landesberg said following a census, other public jurisdictions like school districts and ports change their boundaries, but it doesn't seem to be as big of a deal as the council districts' boundaries.

"They all redistrict and they don't make it so political," Landesberg said.

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# County buildable lands report ends nearly four-month-long hearing

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Clark County may finally have the technical resources required by the state in order to eventually make changes to how the county plans for growth.

During its June 7 meeting, the Clark County Council directed county staff to place a resolution to approve a Buildable Lands Report and Vacant Buildable Lands Model onto the council's June 21 meeting schedule. After months of delay through a protracted public hearing that started in February, the council is finally moving forward on work required to eventually complete an update to the county's Comprehensive Growth Management Plan in 2025.

Generally, the model and report analyze the types and amount of buildable land available in the county through 2035. According to the analysis, the county has sufficient land for residential, commercial and industrial development through that timeframe.

That analysis has been under scrutiny during the months of the hearing, which was extended three times to the June meeting.

Jennifer Baker, president of the Columbia River Economic Development Council, questioned how much of the land zoned for employment purposes — commercial and industrial — would end up being developed. Baker said the findings in the report will stifle recruitment efforts, especially in manufacturing.

She said in the last 17 months, the council has been unable to place 13 employers who are looking for 20 acres or more, each of which have the potential to bring in more than 100 jobs, and as many as 3,000.

"The difference between the model and reality culminates not only in the amount of the employment land, but the buildability of that land in practice," Baker said.

Tim Schauer, president and CEO of MacKay Sposito, came to the June 7 meeting to "advocate, even plea" for a revision on assumptions on how much commercial and industrial land would actually be developed, per the report. Schauer asked for changes that would drop assumptions on what land in both zoning designations would be developed to as low as 10% in critical areas, or land with ecological and geographical constraints.

"While these three aggressive

assumptions may have been more valid in the last 20 years, they are no longer reasonable, no longer realistic, and frankly out of sync with our community's values," Schauer said.

He said the model used in the report was "precise, but not accurate, and the consequences will be significant, if not dire" should it not be adjusted.

Justin Wood, who represented the Clark County Association of Realtors, mentioned a study by ECONorthwest, which showed Washington has the lowest housing unit to household ratio in the

nation. Wood said the current comprehensive plan for the county calls for no housing type to be more than 75% of housing stock, though Vancouver has surpassed that with multifamily units.

Both Wood and Eric Golemo, a member of an advisory committee formed to steer the direction of the model and report, said a change by the council which was approved during one of their regular "council time" proceedings would be detrimental to the model and the report. The change allowed the use of residential densities that had already been achieved as opposed to ones based on a target.

Golemo said he was "dumbfounded" at the decision to go with the achieved density, noting it isn't a requirement by state statute. Wood said using that density model will only aggravate an already tight housing market. Currently, Clark County has a median home price of \$528,000, he said.

Councilor Richard "Dick" Rylander moved to reconsider going with achieved density over the target density. Rylander said at the time he believed it was a requirement to use that density for the modeling.

"There appears to me to be in the statutes considerable allowance for the county to approach this from a number of different angles," Rylander said.

His motion did not pass. Rylander and council chair Karen Bowerman voted for the reconsideration.

Different Clark County city staff members also raised concerns that were counter to what those of the residential building industries brought forth.

Battle Ground Community Development Director Sam Crummett said based on his city's 2021 land use master plan, the city has sufficient capacity for residential needs, compared to a 143-acre deficit in the report.

"We do need additional acreage for lands for jobs, really to compete locally and nationally to bring in some larger employers,"

Crummett said.

Ridgefield Community Development Director Claire Lust said the report did not account for residential growth in nonresidential-zoned land. The city uses mixed-use overlays which would allow for that type of development.

Lust also countered the perception of a lack of supply. In Ridgefield, nearly 2,000 new builds were completed between April 2018 and April 2022. Even with that increase of supply, the median home price increased from \$395,000 to \$636,000, or about 61%.

Lust noted houses aren't being sold to individuals but to investors who rent them out, going against the idea that a greater housing supply leads to the opportunity for homeowners to build generational wealth.

"Certainly supply is part of the affordability equation, however it's not a simple solution," Lust said.

Councilor Gary Medvigy didn't agree with the assertions of the cities when they said they had enough residential stock.

"It's very patently obvious to anyone who looks, we have a housing shortage. We are so far behind," Medvigy said. "For the model to show that we have 1,400 acres in excess for residential housing, it just doesn't pass the common sense test."

The councilor opined on the gulf between stakeholders and what the report has shown.

"We have had hearing after hearing after hearing, some machinations, I think, all for the positive to get the best possible report that we can," Medvigy said. "We've explored so much of this model yet we still have this huge disagreement ... as far as kind of ignoring what is happening on the ground."

David McDonald, another member on the model and report's advisory committee, said the requests from the building industry are mostly about policy, whereas what was under consideration that day was about data, "not what you want to happen on the ground, but what is happening on the ground."

Councilor Julie Olson said she agreed with most of the people who testified, including those from the building industry and the cities. Olson echoed the focus of the model and the report is based on the data available.

"There's no dispute about what we heard today," Olson said. "The issue is where we deal with these questions."

Councilor Temple Lentz said the recommendations heard from building and development proponents can be achieved on the policy end, "however this is not the place for those things to occur."

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# Battle Ground council takes stand against countywide sales tax hike

The Battle Ground City Council won't put its support behind a ballot measure that would impose a .1% retail sales tax in the county to fund body-worn cameras, contending the city has already funded public safety measures and its own transportation issues take precedence.

During its June 6 meeting, the council unanimously voted down a resolution in support of the tax measure put forth by the county. If supported by a majority of voters, the ballot measure would impose the tax to fund public safety, which includes plans for body and vehicle dash cameras for the Clark County Sheriff's Office.

If approved, the tax increase is projected to generate \$12 million annually. Of that, 60% would go to the county and 40% would go to cities on a per-capita basis. Based on population, Battle Ground is projected to receive \$368,000 annually from the tax.

Councilors took issue with the perception that the city would pay for county services due to the uneven split.

Councilor Shane Bowman said the city has already made its police force a priority, whereas the county has struggled with staffing issues at the sheriff's office.

City councilors expressed disapproval of the Clark County Council's decision to forgo incremental increases to its general fund levy over multiple years, which could have been used to pay for the measures the tax would cover.

"We're subsidizing their lack of political will, really," Councilor Troy McCoy said.

McCoy said the county has approved the 1% general fund increase in only three of the past 11 years.

"We have fully funded our police, and the county council is just looking to hide behind the shield of going out to the voters just because they have sloppy leadership," Councilor Adrian Cortes said.

If approved, Battle Ground would be able to "supplant" its current public safety funding with revenue from the tax to free up funds for other uses through the city's general fund.

Deputy Mayor Cherish DesRochers said since cities could supplant the funding from the tax for other city services, it seemed disingenuous for cities to support.

"I feel like it's kind of deceiving to tell people it's a public safety tax, and then tell the cities they can spend it on whatever they want," DesRochers said.

McCoy said Battle Ground's citizens support the police. He went on to say "they probably will vote for it, but we need to, I think, have a very frank and open conversation and be very clear on where this money's going to go toward if it's passed."

Bowman didn't expect other cities to issue a pointed statement against the ballot measure.

"This is an easy way for the municipalities to say 'it ain't our deal, the county is doing it,'" Bowman said.

After some deliberation over how to proceed, the council

agreed to move for approval of the resolution, before all of the councilors voted against it. Bowman remarked the maneuver was indicative of longtime councilor and former mayor Bill Ganley, who was known for making a point during his decades on council before he died in 2016.

"This is Mr. Ganley 101," Bowman said.

Part of councilors' consternations had to do with Battle Ground's own consideration of a sales tax for transportation. During meetings in April and May, the council considered its options to put forth a tax through its transportation benefit district in order to fund road preservation.

Councilors revisited the potential for a tax during the meeting and chose to wait until June 21 to decide whether to put the tax up for a vote. The city can put up to .3% of a sales tax before voters. If approved, each tenth of a percentage increase would generate about \$800,000 in sales tax in 2023, according to city projections.

The council can also enact a .1% sales tax for transportation on its own, but to tax at higher levels, it would require a simple majority vote. Unlike the public safety sales tax, the city would collect all of the revenues, not just a portion of the funds, through a transportation measure.

Battle Ground currently has

roughly \$23.3 million in deferred street maintenance.

City staff previously stated maintaining the current condition of the roads is not sustainable in the long run and making improvements is even harder.

"I walk the roads every day. They stink," Mayor Philip Johnson said. "The road right out in front of (city hall) needs to be fixed."

Johnson is in favor of addressing the issue with the city's streets sooner rather than later, something Bowman agreed with.

"It costs a lot more money to fix that road because we didn't maintain that road, than it does if we maintained it to begin with," Bowman said.

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# Clark County's recent COVID-19 case rate drops, 12 deaths reported

Clark County's latest rate of recent COVID-19 cases experienced a larger decrease than the prior week, though a dozen deaths from the disease were recorded.

Clark County Public Health's June 9 report showed 157.9 COVID-19 cases per 100,000 population over seven days, a drop from the 217.3 per 100,000 reported the prior week.

The case rate previously increased for seven weeks straight before it started to decline, though it still remains as high as it was in February. The county's average was lower than the rate statewide, which is 263.1 per 100,000 in the past 14 days.

Recent case rates lag behind the most recent counts of cases. The health department's most recent case rate was based on activity from May 24 to May 30.

The health department reported 905 new cases between June 2 and June 9, more than the 754 re-

ported between May 26 and June 2. In total, there have been 95,036 confirmed and probable cases in Clark County since the outbreak began.


Clark County Public Health's June 9 report included 11 additional confirmed COVID-19 deaths and one suspected to be due to the disease. The prior week there were two confirmed and three suspected deaths.

The deaths include three men older than 80, a man in his 70s, two men in their 60s, a woman older than 80, a woman in her 70s, two women in their 60s and one woman in her 50s. The suspected death was a man in his 40s.

The deaths put Clark County's total at 827, which includes 725 confirmed and 102 suspected to be due to COVID-19.

The number of COVID-19 patients occupying hospital beds in Clark County experienced a large increase. As of June 9, 26.7% of beds had either patients with confirmed COVID-19 or

patients awaiting test results, up from the 9% reported the week prior. The number of intensive care unit (ICU) beds occupied by COVID-19 patients decreased to 9.4%, down from the 11.3% reported on June 2.

New COVID-19 hospital admissions saw an increase in the latest data. In its June 9 report, the health department reported

10 admissions per 100,000 population in the past seven days, up from 8 admissions per 100,000 population reported June 2.

Though more beds had COVID-19 patients, total hospital bed occupancy in the county dropped overall but rose for ICU beds. The health department reported 96.9% of hospital beds and 98.1% of ICU beds were oc-

cupied in the county, compared to 98% of all beds and 96.2% of ICU beds on June 2.

Clark County's statewide share of confirmed COVID-19 cases and deaths stayed about the same as of June 9 compared to the prior week. The Washington State Department of Health reported the county had about 5.9% of cases and 6.3% of deaths.

## Six members elected to serve on Cowlitz Tribe's general council

The Cowlitz Indian Tribe recently elected six tribal members to three-year terms on its 22-member tribal council.

The council members were elected at the June 4 general council meeting and will be sworn in at the July 9 tribal council meeting. They will serve terms through the end of June 2025, stated a news release.

Each year, members of the tribe are invited to attend the meeting and, if eligible, cast ballots in the election in person or by mail.

The elected members include incumbent Cheryl Bell, incumbent Cassandra Sellards Reck, incumbent Maverick Ryan, Larry Kestner, Kristopher Kitz and Vanessa Robertson.

"On behalf of the Cowlitz Indian Tribe, I extend our deepest congratulations to our newly elected and re-elected Tribal Council members," said Patty Kinswa-Gaiser, the general council chair. "I look forward to hearing from new voices while nurturing strong relationships throughout the council so that, together, we can best fulfill the needs of all the members of our Tribe."

There were 15 candidates this year, which included three in-

cumbents, who vied for the six seats. Councilwoman Barbara Middaugh decided not to pursue another term, stated the release. Two vacant seats were also at stake.

"The Cowlitz People have chosen these respected leaders. Now, as Tribal Council members, they have the opportunity to serve our Cowlitz People," Whitney Mosback, the general council secretary, stated in the release. "Together, as a team, we can make great strides and achieve tremendous success for the community. Congratulations on your new role. I look forward to serving alongside you."

The Cowlitz Indian Tribal Council is a governing body made up of democratically elected members of the tribe. It governs matters related to land management, economic development, service delivery, judicial matters and the tribe's cultural integrity.

The council also exercises legislative powers regarding tribal membership and enrollment. They also negotiate with federal, state and local governments, along with the councils or governments of other tribes.

Voting in tribal elections is open to all enrolled members of the tribe who are 18 or older. The tribe currently has 4,743 enrolled members, stated the release.

## Former Prairie High School student wins national heptathlon championship


Former Prairie High School student Valerie Schmidt won the NAIA National Heptathlon Championship on May 24 at her college of Corban University in Salem, Oregon.

Schmidt, a junior, went through many hardships in preparation for the event, but came out on top. With plans to get married this year, her championship title was icing on the cake.

"It felt pretty great, (but) it was a lot," Schmidt said. "It was kind of an emotional win. There was a lot that led up to it behind the scenes, as there is with everyone, but more so than I had in the past."

Schmidt got sick in the fall with COVID-19, which meant she couldn't work out or train as much as she normally would. She said her living situation was also less than ideal, she had an abscess in her tonsils that had to be removed, along with her wisdom teeth, and she also injured her knee in May of last year.

"During the fall, one of my teammates let me stay in her dorm room because of how bad my sleep was, which I was grateful for because if I didn't have

that, things would've been even worse," she said.

Schmidt noted how difficult the heptathlon was for her. Due to her medical drawbacks, she said her goal for the year was to have fun.

"(The Nationals) came around and I just kept saying 'keep having fun, keep having fun,' and that was so difficult because I was wanting to be really competitive," she said. "I was really discouraged even from the first event because I didn't run like I wanted

to, since in my mind, in order to make 5,000 points, I needed to run what I ran (in hurdles) at the conference, which was a 14.57, instead of a 14.72, which was what I ran (at nationals)."

Schmidt surprised herself with her performances in the rest of the events, as she made three personal records with a long jump of 18 and a half feet, and a javelin throw at 126 feet, 7 inches. She also completed the 800-meter dash in a time of 2:23.94, which resulted in 5,158 total points.

"When I was running around the track, I heard so many people calling my name, even people from other schools," she recalled. "I'm glad I had done some 800-meter work that coach (Todd) Bos gave me before the conference and after conference, because that gave me some confidence in my abilities, because normally I'm pretty shy about the 800."

Schmidt's personal record for the 800-meter dash surprised her the most.

"At the finish line, a rule I had for myself was never lay down after the 800 because you will not be able to get back up," she said. "It's so true, but I broke it this time because I had zero (energy) left."

When she rolled over to see her time on the board, she realized she hit her goal for the 800-meter dash.

"I asked 'did I win? Did I beat her by enough?' I started sobbing because all the work that I had been in for nationals, I didn't know how to feel, so I just started sobbing," Schmidt said. "My parents were crying, everybody was crying, and I just tried not to be emotional."

Schmidt said she plans to major in agriculture business and hopes to obtain a master's degree in business administration.

## COVID pandemic claw back spurs robot growth

Prior to the coronavirus outbreak, economies in the industrial world were moving along fairly smoothly. There were reliable supply chains with "just in time" component arrivals, predictable product deliveries, low interest rates, little inflation, abundant reasonably priced energy, and an adequate workforce in a seemingly peaceful world.

It was a set up for a perfect storm.

That cataclysmic eruption two years ago slammed countries worldwide just like what happened with World War I and the Spanish Flu plague just over a century ago. As if the coronavirus pandemic wasn't enough, Russia's invasion of Ukraine threatens world peace and international supplies of wheat, corn, natural gas and valuable metals such as nickel.

Who could have imagined a war torn Eastern Europe, a run on toilet paper, and parents driving miles to find infant formula? Who would have thought the price of a gallon of gas would soar past \$6 and truckers would pay \$7 a gallon for diesel?

No one pictured empty car lots and six-to-eight months wait lists for new vehicles. When was the last time Boeing's 737 production line in Renton stopped because of a lack of parts?

That's the COVID world we live in and the claw back to a more predictable and stable time is challenging.

Today, inflation is spiking at an 8.26% average for the last year, and nationwide job openings are currently pegged at 11.4 million. That's prompted companies of all sizes to order robots to maintain production and lower costs. Further exacerbating the labor shortage is 4.4 million Americans quit their jobs in April even though the labor department reported the United States economy added 428,000 nonfarm jobs.

"The average paycheck for American workers has gotten bigger during the pandemic. Ordinarily that would be cause to jump for joy. But the reason for this increase is grim: Millions of low-income jobs are gone, and that has pushed average pay higher," Anneken Tappe, CNN Business reported.

Wage increases have been offset by higher prices for groceries, energy and rent.

The one consistent bright spot has been

demand for robots and semiconductors which rely on abundant electricity and skilled workers, not vaccines. As employers struggle to find workers, stabilize output, rebuild dependable supply chains and control costs, robots are rapidly showing up in businesses. Companies, such as Intel and TSMC, are spending hundreds of billions increasing semiconductor fabrication capacity in Arizona and Ohio.

Orders for workplace robots in our country jumped 40% year-over-year in the first quarter of 2022 as U.S. companies are leveraging automation to combat ongoing labor shortages and cut costs as inflation continues to hover near a 40-year high, FOX Business reports.

According to the Association for Advancing Automation (A3), during the first three months of 2022, more than 9,000 robots collectively worth \$544 million were sold in the United States. Across North American, robot sales were the most ever for that same period.

Interestingly, many of the robots come from China. Data released by the International Federation of Robotics shows Chinese sales of industrial robots increased by 19% in 2020.

Long before the pandemic, China's national goal was to shake the image of just being a nation for low-cost manufacturing. Instead, it is becoming known for producing cutting edge, reliable and high quality products, even making robots.

The accelerated switch to robots is across business sectors.

"Companies of all sizes, and increasingly small and medium-sized companies, are deploying robotic and automation because it's more feasible than before," A3's Alex Shikany told Fox Business.

The bottom line is as wages surge ahead, robots are replacing jobs. The key is to have more highly trained workers prepared for a world where robots are increasing at an accelerated pace.

Harold Kushner, the rabbi, author and teacher who wrote the best seller, "When Bad Things Happen to Good People," wrote another book I reread recently.

The book is titled "When All You've Ever Wanted Isn't Enough: The Search for a Life that Matters."

Here is what I have discovered. According to Sonja Lyubromirsky, we all have a "happiness set point." It's partly genetic. If good things happen, your sense of happiness rises. If bad things happen, it falls.

However, no matter what happens, good or bad, your happiness will reset itself to its genetically prone set point. This odd phenomenon is called "hedonic adaptation." You can Google it if you're curious.

My concern here is this: Can we reset our happiness set point?

As a matter of fact, we can.

Certainly, it's human to want what you don't have or be envious of others who have something you want, or to

want someone who doesn't want you. Happiness set point refers to where your happiness lies in relation to events. Are you happy right now? If you are, good. If not, then your happiness set point may need some tweaking. It all boils down to being content with what we have, who we are and who we are with.

Let's examine it further, shall we? How do you feel about lowering expectations? That may not always

be good — just lowering your expectations in certain situations leads to not achieving your full potential. But on the other hand, always chasing something that is elusive is not good either. There are reasons why people who have all they ever wanted are still not happy. A sine qua non needs to be reached if we are to be really happy.

We need to take a closer look at our expectations and weigh

them against our abilities, or dare I say, genetic propensities.

For instance, most of us are not born as musical prodigies. But some of us really want to learn and play music. That's good in and of itself. However, we must understand that we may never be able to write a concerto to rival the likes of Mozart. We need to be OK with that.

Matching our talents and abilities with realism is the key.

What is realistic for you, given your talents and abilities, is the solution to the problem. We all have talents and abilities — we just don't all have the same talents and abilities. Taking a realistic look at what we can do and achieve will give us a unique advantage and help us gain new self-awareness.

We must match our expectations to the realities of what we can do. This will help to reset our happiness set

point. Realistically, decreasing expectations is sometimes hard to do, and not something we have been taught to do. But if we want to reach our full potential, our desires and wants must be in line with our talents and abilities.

We must learn to accept reality. The reality is you may never be president of the United States, but you can be a gourmet chef. We can't deny reality or our genetics — we must embrace both. If we are always striving for what is not achievable that only leads to anxiety and unhappiness.

It is essential and important to celebrate the person you are, not the one you have conjured up in your mind. If you celebrate who you are and your achievements, even the small ones, contentment will follow. When contentment happens, happiness will inevitably follow. When you celebrate wins, it

focuses your attention on the positive.

Learn to express gratitude for your talents, abilities and what you have achieved. Express gratitude for what you already have — even the small things, like that morning cup of coffee. Or the big things, like your family.

So how do you reset your happiness set point? You align your expectancies with reality. Know what you can realistically do and achieve and work toward those ends.

Be content with achievements. Don't live your life by always wanting more or something different.

Live in reality. You can have most anything you want, just not everything you want.

## SHIBA program eases Medicare process for seniors

The Statewide Health Insurance Benefits Advisors (SHIBA) program is short on volunteers in part due to staffing shortages from the COVID-19 pandemic.

The program aims to help senior citizens navigate the Medicare and Medicaid process.

“There’s a great need (for SHIBA),” program coordinator Charlean Hayes Hughes said. “The busiest time is open enrollment, which is when seniors have a lot of questions about their coverage, like if they want to change options.”

Hughes said that throughout the year, she gets referrals on a daily basis. In order to field the large volume of referrals and questions, volunteers are needed so the program can run smoothly.

“The need for volunteers is great too, especially following COVID,” Hughes said. “Every volunteer program took a hit because many seniors are the volunteers for every program I’ve been a part of.”

Volunteers can be anyone over the age of 18. To effectively serve the seniors, Hughes said it takes six to nine months to train a volunteer for adviser positions “to get them ready to answer calls.” For administrative volunteer work, Hughes said it only takes a few weeks of training.

When searching for volunteers, Hughes said SHIBA looks

for “people who follow through and people who are timely because once a client calls in, we have two days to respond to their call and to address their needs, so it’s more characteristics rather than experience.”

Whether the volunteer is a nurse or a boat captain, she said they can come from any walk of life as long as they have an interest in learning the required duties. Hughes admits understanding the nuances of Medicare and Medicaid is difficult, so she wants to ensure the volunteers are effectively able to translate it to the senior citizens who seek help.

For administrative volunteers, Hughes said some of the duties entail putting labels on brochures, entering data into their federal database, and doing outreach.

“A person could do outreach and presentations. They could bring brochures around to medical offices, pharmacies and libraries,” she explained. “Some people are not aware that there’s help for the shared cost of Medicare, so we try to get the word out by putting publicity out there.”

Hughes said volunteers can also participate in special outreach projects like contacting newspapers to ask about advertising or spreading awareness about the public service.

“This is so seniors know two things: That SHIBA exists to help them in an unbiased and free way, and also that if they need help

with the shares cost, that there are people who can help them understand how to access those benefits,” Hughes said.

She also mentioned another category of volunteers called the “Senior Medicare Patrol,” which helps seniors understand how to read their Medicare summary benefits. The volunteers also work to educate seniors so they don’t fall victim to fraud or scams. They advise senior citizens to not give out their social security number or bank account number. Hughes said Medicare fraud can reach over \$60 billion a year.

“Many of the volunteers have gotten to the age of 65 and realized that it’s a lot of choices, and they were either helped by someone in SHIBA and very motivated to do that, or they weren’t helped by someone and wished they had someone like themselves,” she said.

Hughes currently hopes to recruit around 20 more volunteers.


“If I had 50 volunteers, it’d be icing on the cake, but I’ll take the cake,” she said.

Although she would like more adviser volunteers, Hughes said she’s open to people working in whatever area they feel most comfortable.

Tandy Miller, the church's care coordinator and leader of the women's ministry, said this will be the church's fourth year running the event which is open to everyone. With the increased cost of goods across the country, Miller said the drive is more important than ever for people who are in need of clothes.

"The idea came from a lady at our church, Dianne Kroll, who used to go to a church that had a similar event like this," Miller said. "And so we started it four years ago and it's been slowly getting bigger and bigger."

She said the event experienced a "slow start" in its first year. Then the year after was when the COVID-19 pandemic started, which prompted the event to move outside. This year, it will be indoors once again. Miller wants to do what she can to get clothes to people who need them.

"I feel like this year in particular, with the economy the way it is, it will be very appreciated by people, because maybe people don't have extra money to spend on things like new clothes," she said. "They're trying to make the old stuff last. I think in the past, we thought of helping people in our immediate community who had a greater financial need where this might be helpful for them. However, we never limited it. We just trusted people would come and get what they need and that's how it's kind of worked out."

When the event first started, Miller said people couldn't believe the clothes were free, so the church received more donations than they were able to give out.

"I think they felt like 'oh, I'm not in need, I'll just donate.'

But really, if you can cut out an expense in your budget such as clothing, I think it can benefit anybody no matter where you're at financially," she said.

Now that people understand the clothing drive is open to everyone, Miller said more people have shown interest.

"That's our goal, which is to bless the community," she said.

One way people have spread the word is by discussing it on social media and tagging their friends in posts related to the event, she said.

Although the church is grateful for the donations they receive, Miller said they still look for quality clothing.

"We're not looking for just any cast-off clothes that people have," Miller said. "We want good clothes that are ready to wear, not

your old greasy T-shirt. We want nice clothes that people can use when they walk out of there."

She also said Kroll meticulously looks through the clothing donations to ensure they are of a good quality. The number of donations also slightly increases every year, Miller said.

At this time, Miller said the church has two large boxes worth of clothes for the drive. They pick up donations twice a week.

Miller said the leftover clothes from the drive will be given to Open House Ministries, which helps families in need of housing, work, or other resources.

The drive will be held from 6 to 9 p.m. on June 17 and from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. on June 18.


