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La Center High School staff honored after saving life of 15-year-old student

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Clark-Cowlitz Fire Rescue honored a number of faculty members from La Center High School on June 23 for saving the life of a 15-year-old student who went into cardiac arrest at the school in late May.

Student Tristan Martell was released from the hospital on June 13 and was able to attend the ceremony. Fire Chief John Nohr addressed the audience by stressing how important it is for the public to know what to do during a medical emergency. Nohr said people need to act quickly to ensure the body is not depleted of oxygen and the heart remains beating.

"We really rely on community members to know CPR. We rely on community members to know how to use an AED, an automated external defibrillator, and we rely on them to jump in and make that happen," Nohr said. "We had an incident on May 26 at La Center High School where a young person went into cardiac arrest, and we had several staff members at the school who jumped into action, and because of that, they made a difference in someone's life."

Nohr awarded the Fire Chief

Lifesaving Award to Assistant Principal Daniel Ruiz, arts and drama teacher Sara Rideout, library technician Coral Yee, office assistant Denise Yuecko, and health and physical education teacher Denelle Eisland for

their bravery while saving Martell's life.

Nohr said Rideout was the first person to respond to the situation, as she immediately grabbed an AED once she saw Martell in cardiac arrest.

"An automated external defibrillator is a critical piece of equipment that can be used to save the life of a person in cardiac arrest," Nohr said. "When a

Local lawmakers react to overturn of Roe v. Wade

The U.S. Supreme Court's decision to rule on a case that resulted in the effective overturning of abortion protections from Roe v. Wade has elicited a range of responses from local lawmakers.

On June 24, the court ruled 6-3 on the Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization abortion case, effectively undoing what was determined in 1973's Roe v. Wade. That case established a constitutional right to abortions during the first two trimesters of pregnancy.

Following the ruling, Washington State Rep. Vicki Kraft, R-Vancouver, said she was pleased to see the prior court decision overturned.

"This is a decision that has been long overdue in our nation," Kraft said in a statement following the decision.

Described as "a strong pro-life advocate" in the statement, Kraft pointed to her support of bills which did not make it out of committee that aimed to restrict

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Sheriff candidates detail their experience, goals for office

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The three candidates seeking to replace Clark County Sheriff Chuck Atkins addressed issues facing the office during a June 23 candidate forum hosted by the League of Women Voters of Clark County.

The three candidates all have decades of law enforcement experience.

Vancouver Police Cpl. Rey Reynolds, county sheriff's deputy David Shook and sheriff's chief criminal deputy John Horch addressed issues of crime response, the office's aging jail infrastructure and a general lack of resources at the department, which includes staffing.

As a relative newcomer to the county, Shook joined the sheriff's office in 2020 after decades of law enforcement experience in Oregon.

"It wasn't very long before I recognized how broke the public services here in criminal justice was, and not effectively working," Shook said.

Though increasing deputies' pay is part of the solution to staffing shortages, Shook said he also wants to change the culture of the sheriff's office.

"Once you do that, you're going to attract quality employees, and quality people who want to be a part of this great community of

Clark County," Shook said.

Horch said what he's seeing in the office is unprecedented in his 33 years with the department. The department is currently down 74 positions.

"Clark County Sheriff's Office is my family and we're hurting right now," Horch said.

Horch said in the past year, he has worked to revamp the hiring practices at the sheriff's office. He said the shortage is in part due to an "attack on law enforcement" seen through police reform legislation passed in 2021. Law enforcement locally and across the state have said the laws have kept officers from being effective due to the restrictions.

Horch said he's been pushing the Clark County Council to support improved compensation packages for the sheriff's office.

Reynolds said past practices at the sheriff's office have been "detrimental to the atmosphere" of the department. He said he would "immediately" provide a supplemental budget request of about \$4 million for greater compensation if he is elected.

Regarding the Clark County Jail, Reyn-

olds said a roughly \$425 million replacement of the jail is not the most prudent solution, but pursuing improvements in a more piecemeal approach would be more viable. He also suggested using some of the properties the office utilizes for other detainment needs to alleviate bed demand at the jail.

Shook said any increase in beds would require an increase in jail staff, which like the department as a whole, has been in a beleaguered state as of late.

"I think at some point once we make being a corrections officer an attractive position here in Clark County, we can add (that staffing)," Shook said.

Horch stressed planning for jail improvements would require consultation from professionals who know how to build such facilities.

"Getting in the room and strategizing with experts ... not having people just with good ideas, and figuring out a pathway forward is what needs to happen," Horch said.

On the increasing mental health needs and low-priority calls, Shook said the sheriff's office needs to be

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Yacolt's Rendezvous Days will return on July 1-4

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With Yacolt's Rendezvous Days just around the corner, the community is ready for the annual festival which has become a staple in town.

The four-day event will kick off on Friday, July 1 with a family-friendly kickball tournament at the Little League Fields and will offer a plethora of events that will conclude on Monday, July 4 with a parade.

Mayor Katie Listek is excited to participate in the festivities in the town, as Yacolt celebrates "the freedom that our country gets to enjoy."

"Typically, (Rendezvous Days) was spread out over time," Listek said. "It was days that the community could gather and do some fun things, but I know that it has transitioned over the years, and I really think that it's come together in the last couple of years. Due to certain circumstances, people were really looking to make a bond with the rest of the community because we were lacking so much of it in the past couple of years."

Listek said she wanted to bring back nostalgia by making the event as simple as possible, while carrying on the event's traditions.

"So far, it's been a huge hit," she said.

Listek noted her favorite event

is either the kickball tournament or the watermelon-eating contest, which this year will take place at 7 p.m. on Saturday, July 2. She described both of the events as "extremely fun to watch" and "very entertaining for everyone."

The kickball tournament started in 2021 and was geared toward participants of all ages and skill levels. This year, however, Listek said the event will feature two divisions. The first one on July 1 appeals to families, while the second tournament on July 2 is more for competitive players.

"We got so much feedback last year about it being so much fun, which is why we added the competitive day for Saturday while the (outdoor vendor) market and everything will be going on," Listek said.

Besides the consistent vendors at the outdoor market, she mentioned that a new restaurant, Backroads, will host its grand opening during Yacolt's Rendezvous Days. The restaurant will serve pizza by the slice. Listek said it is owned by Mike Casetta and Matthew Seise, who also own Playmakers in Battle Ground.

Rendezvous Days is also known for its Fourth of July parade, which will feature Amboy Hardware, local real estate agents, the Model A Ford Club of America, and a logging truck. It's scheduled to take place at 10 a.m. on Monday, July 4.

The winners of the parade will be announced following the parade at 11 a.m. at the Little League fields.

"Last year, we had a really big log truck, because the theme of our town is that we're a logging town," Listek said. "The reason Yacolt was founded was because we have a logging theme. The train provided that, and now a majority of people out here are loggers, so we always try to incorporate the history of the town into our celebration."

Last year, Listek said she rode in the parade on a lawnmower, but she's still deciding what her transportation method will be this time around. She plans to go with something that's "non-traditional."

"I don't want to just sit in the back of a fancy car and wave," she

said. "I really like to be more involved and show a little more personality than that."

Yacolt won't light off fireworks during the festival. They will instead light up the town square, which is similar to what they do for the Christmas season.

The Bigfoot Fun Run will also return this year. It will start at 9 a.m. on Saturday, July 2.

The run is broken up into a 5K and 10K trail that reaches Bells Mountain. Listek said she has friends who are currently preparing for the fun run with their kids.

"I know a lot of people are getting really excited to participate in the run and be able to relax and do the chalk contest, maybe enjoy the sprinklers and the bounce slide

we'll have out here as well," she said.

Listek said the sidewalk chalk art contest, which starts at 11 a.m. on July 2, is what really got her involved with the Yacolt community. She used to organize the event.

The contest features different age groups. Those judging the contest are not personally affiliated with the artists themselves in order to keep the friendly competition fair, she said.

Republicans release statement criticizing Inslee, Democrats for inaction on tax reductions in face of mounting inflation

In a statement released on June 15, Republican ranking member for the Senate Ways and Means Committee Lynda Wilson, R-Vancouver, and state Senate Republican Leader Sen. John Braun, R-Centralia, heralded a recently released revenue forecast as evidence supporting their

continued calls for tax reductions as a way of decreasing the effects of the high levels of inflation the country is experiencing.

The forecast, released on June 15 after a meeting of the Economic and Revenue Forecast Council (ERFC), showed an increase in revenues of \$1.55 billion for the 2021-2023 budget

cycle the state is currently in and a \$1.11 billion increase for the 2023-2025 biennium.

"It's ridiculous for the Legislature to be sitting on a growing mountain of cash while families across our state are struggling to afford the basics and watching their buying power shrink because of inflation," Braun said in

the statement.

Braun repeated his call for the Legislature to meet in a special session to suspend the gas tax, which he claims would "immediately lower the price at the pump by almost 50 cents."

The Republican leader also criticized Gov. Jay Inslee for what Braun believed were false claims.

"Either he doesn't understand the details of the legislation or he is willfully misleading the people," Braun said about Inslee.

Braun then pointed to the Democratic governors of New York and California as examples of Democrats who have pushed for changes to their states' gas taxes in the face of inflation before accusing Democrats in the Legislature of supporting Inslee on the issue of gas tax suspension.

"The members of the current legislative majority seem to be in lockstep with his no-relief attitude," Braun said.

Wilson, who in addition to serving as the top Republican on

the Senate Ways and Means Committee serves as a member of the ERFC, focused her criticism more squarely on her Democratic colleagues in the Legislature.

"Let's remember also how Democrats not only opposed our bill to reduce property taxes, but even blocked Republican legislation to make diapers tax-free and backtracked on their own modest offer to allow free entry to state parks and fairs," Wilson said.

Wilson claimed Washington residents have experienced "government greed" since Democrats took control of both houses of the Legislature in late 2017.

"As there's no end in sight for this wave of inflation, why won't the majority join with Republicans to get some dollars back into the hands of families — starting with a suspension of the gas tax? The trouble is, I see no signs of empathy from our Democratic colleagues for the financial struggles many of their constituents are experiencing," Wilson said.

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North Clark County council district candidates discuss issues in forum

The 2022 primary election is only five weeks away and candidates for Clark County Council's newest district stated their cases for election as part of a recent series of forums

During a June 22 forum organized by the League of Women Voters of Clark County, four candidates for county council District 5 participated as they answered questions on a variety of issues. They included Sue Marshall, Rick Torres, Richard Rylander and Don Benton. The new council district represents the north part of the county.

The league began its forum series that evening, allowing local races with more than two candidates the chance to speak ahead of the Aug. 2 election.

Civility, housing and jail issues

Apart from introductions, candidates were first asked about the importance of civility in the county council's functions. Marshall, a Ridgefield family farm manager who's been involved with local land use issues, said a lack of civility makes the public less likely to participate and isn't conducive to problem solving.

"It is important for the council itself to model civil discourse," Marshall said.

Torres, a U.S. Marines veteran and retired law enforcement with more than a decade of experience, said "there's ample room for improvement."

Rylander, the current District 5 seatholder, said he's attempted to bring "a modicum of respect" to the council since he was appointed to the position in May.

"We need to ... make an effort to reach out to all people of all persuasions to understand what they have to say and to listen carefully to them," Rylander said.

Benton, a former Washington State Senator and head of the Selective Service Administration under former president Donald Trump, said he was "part of some pretty raucous debate on the floor of the senate."

"We never broke into calling each other names or uncivil behavior, and that's because we have rules," Benton said. "The rules need to be very clear and they need to be enforced."

"You can attack ideas and you can fight against concepts,

but you shouldn't attack people," Benton said.

On affordable housing, Torres said it is one of his main priorities "because at the end of the day, affordable housing affects our entire community" as it impacts economic development and prices out workers. He suggested having specific incentives that use the limited funds the county has.

Rylander said he has asked county staff to look into the potential for subdividing large rural lots with dozens of acres into relatively smaller five-acre parcels.

"We have to put the tools in place to allow the flexibility to maintain lifestyles while providing additional housing opportunities," Rylander said.

Benton said he's heard the term "affordable housing" for years. He said raising taxes, fees and restricting land through the state's Growth Management Act raises the price of land.

"Affordable means reducing government costs and fees, making it so that the builder can build the house for less and sell it for less," Benton said.

Marshall commended county staff and the council for their work and recent approval of the county's housing options study.

"The land itself does not guarantee that the housing is going to be affordable," Marshall said. She said houses going in at developments near Southwest 179th Street are already going for more than half a million dollars.

Regarding the Clark County Jail, Rylander said he recently toured the facility which put the aging structure's predicament into perspective.

"The jail is (in) abysmally terrible condition," Rylander said.

Rylander noted a straight-up replacement would cost upwards of half a billion dollars, leading to a need for the council to "squeeze our current budgets" to find funds for the needed repairs.

Benton said that while the jail has the potential for additional capacity, the Clark County Sheriff's Office does not have the staff to handle an increase. He agreed the jail's condition warrants improvements, but said the question centers on whether citizens are willing to help pay for some of the costs.

Marshall said she would prioritize an increase and retention of staffing at the jail, safety improvements and "robust" public

engagement on any jail improvement plans.

Torres said the current condition of the jail is the same as it was when he started his law enforcement career in the county in 1999.

Any improvements needed have to be addressed through a collaborative process with professionals, he said.

"If you don't know how to run a jail, build a jail, you really don't have much of a perspective on telling someone how to do that and setting up a budget for that," Torres said.

Transportation and rural development

Benton said since county road funding is exclusive to roads and highways, he wouldn't use any of those funds for light rail infrastructure. The current plan to replace the aging Interstate 5 bridge over the Columbia River will extend light rail from Portland to Evergreen Boulevard in Vancouver.

"Light rail peaked 15 years ago and ridership has been dropping ever since," Benton said.

He said additional crossings

over the Columbia River is a priority.

Marshall said the county's focus should be public safety issues resulting from increased development through the use of road funding to provide adequate infrastructure.

Marshall said an additional Columbia River crossing would require hundreds of thousands of dollars to fund the initial research. She said her prior experience with Oregon allowed her to develop relationships with the state's officials who would need to be involved in any bridge project.

Torres said major thoroughfares across the county are important. He recalled the limited options first responders have when doing their jobs.

Through meetings with individuals and groups in North Clark County, Rylander said those residents have "little appetite" for the county putting funds toward the I-5 bridge replacement specifically given the limited traffic relief the current plans feature.

Rylander also mirrored Marshall's concern regarding a focus on improving the county's exist-

ing road network.

"They want the roads in place so that we have the infrastructure to support family-wage jobs," Rylander said.

Marshall, who is a farm manager, said local farming brings in \$50 million annually, but is suffering due to a lack of leadership. She said the county needs to "dust off" its Agriculture Preservation Strategies Report.

"We have an amazing rural, agricultural resource that has been inappropriately pitted against development," Marshall said. "A vibrant, rural landscape is an amenity to neighboring cities."

Torres entertained the potential for tax incentives for agricultural production and modifying code to allow farmers to do more on their land.


"Farming is a big part of our heritage in Clark County, from the small family farm to the large corporate farm," Torres said.

Rylander pointed to the region's history as a reason to support agriculture in Clark County.

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Clark County's recent COVID-19 case rate sees second week of increase

Clark County's latest rate of recent COVID-19 cases saw another increase based on the latest data.

Clark County Public Health's June 23 report showed 175.1 COVID-19 cases per 100,000 population over seven days, a slight increase from the 159.3 per 100,000 reported the prior week.

The case rate has been increasing for two weeks as of June 23's report. The county's average case rate continues to be lower than the rate statewide, which is 226.3 per 100,000 in the past seven days, though the state rate decreased from 261.9 per 100,000 last week while the county's rate rose.

Recent case rates lag behind the most recent counts of cases. The health department's most recent case rate was based on activity from June 7 to June 13.

The health department reported 921 new cases between June 16 and June 23, slightly more than the 893 reported between June 9

and June 16. In total, there have been 96,850 confirmed and probable cases in Clark County since the outbreak began.

Clark County Public Health's June 23 report included three additional confirmed COVID-19 deaths and four suspected to be due to the disease, up from one confirmed death and two suspected deaths reported last week.

The confirmed deaths were two men in their 70s and a woman older than 80. The suspected deaths were two men older than 80, a man in his 70s and a woman older than 80.

The deaths put Clark County's total at 837, including 729 confirmed and 108 suspected to be due to the disease.

The number of COVID-19 patients occupying hospital beds in Clark County experienced an increase from the prior week. As of June 23, 12.4% of beds had either patients with confirmed COVID-19 or patients awaiting test results, up from the 10.8% reported June 9. The number of

intensive care unit (ICU) beds occupied by COVID-19 patients increased to 14.8%, up from the 5.3% reported on June 16.

New COVID-19 hospital admissions saw a decrease in the latest data. In its June 23 report, the health department reported 8 admissions per 100,000 population in the past seven days, down from 8.6 admissions per 100,000 population reported June 16.

Total hospital bed occupancy in the county rose overall with fewer ICU beds occupied as of the latest numbers. The health department reported 98.7% of hospital beds and 96.3% of ICU beds were occupied in the county, compared to 97.6% of all beds and 98.2% of ICU beds on June 16.

Clark County's statewide share of confirmed COVID-19 cases and deaths stayed about the same as of June 23 compared to the prior week. The Washington State Department of Health reported the county had about 5.9% of cases and 6.4% of deaths.

Fireworks on sale though discharge in Clark County is limited

Fireworks for the Fourth of July went on sale June 28 in much of the county, though lighting them off is confined to only Independence Day per county code.

"Even though fireworks are offered for sale starting on June 28, remember that they are not allowed to be used until July 4," Clark County Fire Marshal Dan Young stated in a news release.

Residents can use fireworks in unincorporated Clark County from 9 a.m. to midnight Monday, July 4.

Vancouver has banned fireworks within its city limits altogether, and rules vary in other cities in the county. According to the county's website, Ridgefield's prohibition on discharge is the same as the county's. In Battle Ground, discharge is only allowed from 9 a.m. to 11 p.m. on July 3 and from 9 a.m. to midnight on July 4. La Center also allows discharge on two days. Fireworks can be discharged from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m. on July 3 and from 9 a.m. to midnight on July 4.

Yacolt has the broadest discharge allowance in Clark County, spanning from 9 a.m. to midnight from June 29 to July 4, and from 9 a.m. to 11 p.m. on July 5.

Illegal use of fireworks, like firing them at times they aren't allowed or by using types that are banned, are subject to a \$500 civil fine for first time offenders in Clark County.

More information on permitted times for fireworks and what types are not allowed is available online at clark.wa.gov/community-development/fireworks. The interactive map on the website also allows the public to quickly determine the rules for fireworks use based on an address anywhere in the county. Each location selling fireworks in the county is required to post signage outlining when fireworks can le-

gally be used.

Clark Regional Emergency Services Agency has established this phone number for reporting nuisance fireworks complaints: 360-597-7888. Residents are asked not to call 911 or 311 for the purpose of reporting nuisance fireworks.

Residents and visitors are urged to celebrate the Fourth of July with extra caution because improper use of fireworks can lead to grass or structure fires.

"Fireworks start more than 19,000 fires and send more than 9,100 people to emergency rooms nationwide each year," Young stated in the release.

People who plan to buy fireworks are recommended to do so locally from a stand inspected by the Clark County Fire Marshal's Office. Fireworks purchased outside of the county may not be legal in the area.

The county has recommended a number of precautions to prevent fires from occurring:

- Always have a bucket of water and water hose ready to douse any fire.
- Assign a responsible adult to supervise fireworks use.
- Use fireworks outdoors in a clear area away from buildings, vehicles and dry vegetation.
- Never aim fireworks at people or structures.
- Never attempt to alter fireworks or relight "duds" that fail to ignite.
- Place used fireworks in a bucket of water to soak overnight before disposing of them. These devices can still be smoldering and could start a fire if placed in a trash receptacle.


He was united in marriage to Norma M. Norman on June 24, 1955, in Seaside, Oregon. They would have celebrated their 67th wedding anniversary this month. Following their marriage, they resided in the communities of Birkenfeld, Taft, Medford and Warren, Oregon; Flagstaff, Arizona; Los Angeles and Sacramento, California; and back to Warren, Oregon, in 2004. In 2006, they

became full time RVers, hiking the desert, Death Valley or just hills, wherever they parked. Then it was time to find a home they could stay at in the summer, then head south in the winter. In 2012, they bought a home in Woodland, Washington, where they have resided since.

Bruce owned and operated his own log truck when in Birkenfeld and Taft (now Lincoln City.) Later he bought a share in a plywood mill in White City, Oregon, before driving a freight truck for ONC, McLean and finally Roadway, retiring at the age of 65.

When the kids were in 4-H, he helped with the horses and the club. The boys discovered motorcycles. He did a cross country race from Burns to Bend and finished. Their daughter sold her horse, got a part-time job and finished her schooling. While exercising on a Nordictack and watching the Boston Marathon, he thought that it had to be more fun than it looked, so he started running. Over the years, he ran in and finished 19 marathons.

Bruce was preceded in death by his parents, Thorvel Larsen and Violet Stuve; two stepbrothers, Paul and Walter Larsen; brother

Officials say public safety sales tax would benefit law enforcement and justice systems

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Clark County's government wants its citizens to know the approval of a .1% increase on retail sales tax would be used to benefit its beleaguered law and justice system.

During an informational forum on June 23, county staff and county council chair Karen Bowerman provided information about the upcoming sales tax proposal on the Aug. 2 ballot. If approved, the measure would help fund a body-worn and vehicle dashboard-based camera program for the Clark County Sheriff's Office.

Bowerman stressed the intent of the forum was to provide information on what the funding, which is estimated at \$12 million county-wide, could provide.

"The question of a new sales tax goes to voters for a reason. It's for you to decide," Bowerman said.

Buying the cameras is relatively simple, but Bowerman said the ongoing cost is the issue that requires a steady funding source.

She acknowledged a similar proposition in November was "soundly defeated" as only 42%

of voters supported the measure. Bowerman said the measure likely failed because it was designated for jails and juvenile detention facilities and not explicitly for body cameras. She said the council believes the public will accept the tax hike more readily if it specifically points out how the money would be used.

If approved, 60% of the tax's revenues will go to the county, while 40% is earmarked for cities on a per-capita basis. Cities are allowed to decide how to utilize the funding, though it must go toward public safety. It, however, wouldn't preclude a city from diverting existing revenues it currently puts toward public safety toward other expenses.

Clark County Manager Kathleen Otto said the county's property tax revenue is fairly stable, while other revenues are experiencing a slight decline. The sales tax has increased in "an unprecedented manner" in 2022, Otto said. If the sales tax maintains its level of increase, it would result in \$10 million more than what was budgeted.

The increase would change the county's budgeting process, which has incorporated a structural deficit for a number of years,

Otto said. The increase isn't expected to last, however.

"While we are seeing this unprecedented increase, it is not sustainable," Otto said.

Officials on both sides of the law and justice equation were in support of implementing the body camera program.

"It's really an essential tool of the sheriff's office that we are fully in support of," Clark County Sheriff Chuck Atkins said about body cameras.

Atkins said the implementation of body cameras would allow for greater transparency in the community, who he said is clearly in support of the program's implementation.

That said, having the staff to run the public records requests alongside the storage of video data would require more than what the department is currently capable of.

"There's a lot more to it than just strapping on a camera or putting a camera in a police car," Atkins said.

The benefits are great, Atkins

said, because the program will help with the integrity of reporting on instances.

"In the height of a high-adrenaline event, our clarity isn't always exactly as it could be," Atkins said.

Atkins said the equipment can also be used for training purposes among sheriff's office staff so they can view real-life encounters.

"This, I believe, not only will make the community more aware and (the department) be more transparent to the community, it will make them safer. It will make us safer," Atkins said.

Atkins explained having footage could help validate deputies' statements.

"If there are those kinds of complaints that come in against our law enforcement, for speeding, actions in the field ... we can pull that film, we can look at it and we can clearly see if it did or didn't happen the way the complainant was stating," Atkins said.

Clark County Prosecutor Tony

Golik said his office would use the program for evidence which could carry more weight than the sworn affidavits currently used.

"It's one thing to read the officer's recitation about what happened in a case and what they observed. It's another thing to actually have video," Golik said. "It certainly isn't just about officer accountability. It's about obtaining the best evidence through this essential tool."

Since the revenue is only earmarked for public safety, the ballot measure could also provide funds for other issues facing the county like improvements at the Clark County Jail.

Atkins said the current jail was built in 1984 with 306 beds, which is less than the current 400-plus inmate level it houses.

"Ideally we'd build a whole new jail and it'd be bigger, but that may not happen," Atkins said.

If the sheriff's office receives more funds, it would focus on the remodel and relocation of administrative offices, as well as improving conditions in other areas.

"Yes, we must retain and support family farm lands, if for no other reason (than) to make sure we're connecting the people who live in the cities who don't have any understanding of where the food comes from in the system, to actually reach out and put them in contact with the land," Rylander said.

Benton said he has supported agricultural interests like the Clark County Fair during his time in the area. He said the county should back farmers with water rights issues with the Washington State Department of Ecology.

"It's important for our survival that we continue to have a rural community, a farming community," Benton said.

Candidates were also asked about the potential for industrial development along the Chelatchie Prairie Railroad, much of which lies within the district.

Torres said industrial developments in "small pockets" may be viable along the railroad, but noted it has to be weighed with the current environment of residents living near the line.

"We could have some eco-

nomics development there, but is it worth what would be given up to build on those lands?" Torres posited.

Rylander said development along the rail could help bring family-wage jobs to the county. Acknowledging the impacts on nearby landowners, he believes "the pros outweigh the cons" with that kind of development.

"We've got to pull more jobs from Oregon back to Washington state," Rylander said.

Benton said he was disappointed the county has yet to act on its work to allow for the development.

"The room for expansion is immense," Benton said. "I don't know what they're waiting for to bring jobs to rural North Clark County."

Marshall agreed the railroad is an asset, but said there have been a number of missteps the county previously took when it attempted to implement industrial uses along the railroad several years ago.

"The community was really outraged at the prospect, and it was not clear at all what industrial uses were going to be put in place there," Marshall said.

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
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Battle Ground teen wins medals at Special Olympics competition

Battle Ground High School swimmer Hezekiah Hewes secured a gold and bronze medal during the 2022 Spring Games for the Special Olympics.

Hewes, who has Down syndrome, secured first place in the state's unified 50-meter swim event on July 19, and also placed third in the 25-meter.

"I feel great (about the medal)," Hewes said. "I got a gold and a bronze. I like swimming because of Coach Michelle. And I like the water and my teammates."

His mother, Chandra, was thrilled when she witnessed her son's achievement. On top of his medals, he also graduated with a 4.0 GPA.

"We were so excited for him and happy," Chandra said. "We always tease him that he can't come home without a medal, and it's something my husband started back when we first started with the Special Olympics. It's something that stuck with him and he works his hiney off to make sure he gets a medal of some sort to come home with."

Chandra said Hewes will attend the after-school program to receive school services until he's 21. He also participated in unified bowling and basketball throughout his time in high school.

"This was his eighth year in Special Olympics swimming and his second time to win gold at the state level," she said. "It's been a long time since he's won his first one, which was really exciting because they hadn't gone to state in a couple years due to COVID, so to jump back into swimming was exciting to see."

Chandra said the team had to

prepare for the event by finding a pool that was open. The nearest one available was in Kelso.

"That made it kind of difficult, but they made it work," Chandra said.

Another obstacle the team faced was lifeguards who did not show up to the pool, limiting the amount of practice time they had. Despite the odds, Hewes came out on top.

"The season has been kind of a struggle, but for these guys to come out and be able to still prevail is pretty exciting," she said.

Chandra describes Hewes as "a friend to everyone." She said her son is "loving, caring, very helpful, and loves everyone."

"I think the whole town just about knows him, and if they don't, they soon will know him," she said.

This year, Hewes was on the high school's prom court and participated in the Mister Battle Ground pageant, where he won the people's choice award. She also said Hewes has always loved water and swimming, which inspired him to participate in Special Olympics.

"It was kind of hard to figure out how to get him to be part of Special Olympics, because originally, they were only allowed to start at 8, but at 10 years old we finally figured out how to get him through, and he's been with the team ever since," Chandra said.

Once Hewes turns 21 and can no longer receive school services, Chandra said she will try to help him find a part-time job.

"Whatever he does, it's going to have to be something that involves people and being super-friendly with them, because he's definitely a people-person. He loves being social," Chandra said.

Residential use in Woodland's highway commercial zone is now prohibited

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The Woodland City Council has taken action to put a stop to residential uses in commercially-zoned land by outright prohibiting it in a section of its city zoning.

During its June 20 meeting, the city council voted 6-1 to approve an ordinance restricting new residential uses in the city's highway commercial zones. That zoning mainly exists on land located off of the city's two interchanges with Interstate 5.

The decision caps off about a year's worth of discussion on how Woodland will handle development propositions to build housing in that zone. Last year, the council voted to put a moratorium in place to prevent construction or expansion of such uses in all of its commercial zones, Community Development Director Travis Goddard said.

The moratorium extension was also on the agenda for the meeting, but after the council passed the ordinance to make the code changes, the extension was rendered moot, Goddard explained.

"The moratorium is simply to keep people from sneaking in the back door while we're trying to take care of business," Goddard said.

The moratorium stemmed from a planned senior living development that was going to be housed behind Safeway in the highway commercial zoning district. More recently, a developer was looking to bring about 400 apartment units to Belmont Loop

on the other side of Interstate 5.

Goddard said a recommendation from the city's planning commission came before the council in March but it was remanded by the council back to the commission. The initial recommendation stated the need for one floor of commercial space for every three floors of residential space in a project. He said that recommendation was a compromise of suggestions by developers based on the current market conditions and the commission felt it was more in line with development in Woodland.

Upon revisiting it, Goddard said the commission ultimately recommended outright elimination of residential uses in the city's highway commercial zoning district. He said the commission wanted the restriction in place until the city was able to garner feedback from the public on what citizens would like to see regarding residential development in commercial zones.

Councilor Carol Rounds was initially in favor of allowing one floor of residential for every floor of commercial, which is also something that was suggested by Mayor Will Finn. Finn said the Belmont Loop development had a ratio of three residential floors to one commercial. Goddard said that ratio didn't have an effect on the allowed density.

Rounds pushed back on the larger-scale developments that led to the moratorium.

"That's not what it's here for. It's for a mom-and-pop business, or any business that wants

to have their business below and live up above, where it's economical for them," Rounds said.

Councilor DeeAnna Holland agreed that Rounds' idea was applicable for downtown, though she didn't agree with it being the case in the highway commercial zoning. She remarked on the current zoning situation and the potential exploitation of code should that zone not be excluded from residential uses.

"It's weird that you have house, house, business. ... It doesn't make sense that this is

light industrial across the street from housing, and then now people want to pack houses or any kind of living situation out by the freeway," Holland said. "I'm a big proponent of housing people, but that one just seems silly to me."

Councilors Rounds and Jennifer Rowland were the only ones to vote in favor of the one-to-one ratio. Rounds was also the only councilor to vote against the approval of the residential prohibition in the highway commercial zone.

During the discussion, Councilor Melissa Doughty was the first to suggest going with the planning commission's recommendation.

"There's no reason to have housing in the highway district at this time," Doughty said.

Councilor Monte Smith noted the council could address future projects that looked to put residential uses in the zone.

"I think if somebody comes to the council with a good project, they can bring it forward to us and we can determine if it would be a good fit in that area," Smith said.

Jaime Herrera Beutler says she has secured over \$3.6M for Southwest Washington residents this year

"Whether that's someone who needs a passport expedited or a veteran who needs assistance scheduling a doctor appointment or receiving an ID card from the VA, my team and I will do whatever we can to get things done for residents."

Clark County Council approves buildable lands model, report

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The Clark County Council has signed off on a report and model for vacant property in the county which eventually will help the county make changes as it plans for growth.

During its June 21 meeting, the county council voted 3-2 to approve a Buildable Lands Report and Vacant Buildable Lands Model. The process to create the report and model played out through a monthslong hearing,

which finally concluded earlier this month.

Generally, the model and report analyze the types and amount of buildable land available in Clark County through 2035. According to the analysis, the county has sufficient land for residential, commercial and industrial development through that timeframe.

Not everyone with a stake in the model and report's development believes that conclusion to be the case. Clark County Council Chair Karen Bowerman, who

voted against its approval, pointed to a number of points in the work which caused her concern. A number of those issues were raised by representatives of building, real estate and economic development interests in the county.

"There are many things that I find inappropriate or unacceptable for Clark County in this buildable lands report," Bowerman said.

Of those issues, she said the report looks into 2035 population estimates, which is in conflict with the report's ostensible focus on

past development. She also took issue with the report's conclusion that the county will be able to accommodate the growth with the land designations it has.

"No way in my judgment from our accommodating ... the employers who have an interest in coming to Clark County, does that statement fly," Bowerman said.

She also said the report's methodology isn't in sync with what economic development organizations see when they try to find land that meets specific market criteria for businesses looking to set up shop in Clark County. With regard to residential development, she said the model eliminates opportunities "for equity and associated appreciation and generational wealth."

The report and model, as approved, feature a few adjustments requested by the project's advisory committee. Bowerman said input from a coalition of building industry interests "is almost completely stripped" from the report, and suggested it was refined from the coalition that was omitted.

Clark County Community Planning Director Oliver Orjiako responded to Bowerman's concerns, which he said could largely be addressed during the county's 2025 update to its comprehensive growth management plan.

"Nothing in this report prevents us from having conversations on what to do with land for jobs. Nothing in this report prevents the county and the cities addressing affordable housing," Orjiako said.

Bowerman was joined by Richard Rylander in voting against the approval. Councilor Gary Medvigy, who alongside councilors Temple Lentz and Julie Olson voted for approval, said "nothing has been lost" from the past year of input by building real estate and economic development interests.

"We have a lot of work ahead of us ... and a lot of policy decisions yet to be made," Medvigy said.

The county was just shy of the June 30 deadline to submit the report to the Washington State Department of Commerce.

Battle Ground sales tax proposal stalls in discussions

Proposals to enact a retail sales tax in the city limits of Battle Ground for road maintenance and projects didn't receive enough support from city councilors, though potential votes on ballot measures in November or February aren't completely out of the picture.

During its June 21 meeting, the council voted down three motions regarding a sales tax increase for the city's transportation benefit district. Since April, the council has discussed either enacting a .1% increase on its own, or placing an increase of up to .3% in front of voters.

If approved, a tax is estimated to provide \$800,000 of revenue for the transportation benefit district per .1% increase. The tax discussion comes as the city looks at ways it can fund road maintenance to keep or exceed current conditions.

At the June 21 meeting, staff recommended a .2% tax, which would provide the city with sustainable funding that would prevent the city's road conditions from falling further behind on ratings.

Councilor Shane Bowman compared the tax to a recycling agreement that maintains weekly service with a \$2-per-month increase, which the city approved right before the sales tax discussion. It would require \$24,000 in gross retail purchases from a household to reach the level of a .1% increase.

"I haven't had one neighbor complain to me about garbage. I haven't had one neighbor complain to me about water or sewer. I've had a lot of people complain to me about roads," Bowman said.

He also referenced a previous meeting where the council voted against supporting a countywide public safety sales tax measure. Councilors argued the county is attempting to make up for its own poor financing practices by putting some of the burden on cities.

"This 100% goes to our community," Bowman said about the transportation sales tax.

Mayor Philip Johnson noted the tax would be paid by people who patronize businesses within the city limits, and wouldn't solely impact the residents who live in Battle Ground.

"It's not just about the 21-22,000 of us that live in the city, it's the other (60,000) that come visit us," Johnson said.

Johnson reiterated a stance he took in previous meetings. He doesn't want to be a councilmember who pushes off road upkeep that future councils will have to address.

Bowman agreed that improving the roads is a chief concern for the city.

"You will not have economic development if you have crappy roads," Bowman said. "If you don't fix what you have, no one wants to do business with you."

Deputy Mayor Cherish DesRochers said from her understanding the .1% tax council could enact on its own would be enough to improve the city's roads.

"My concern is if we push the .1% and then we put it out to vote (later), people are going to be upset that we raised their taxes anyways, so they may not support it," DesRochers said.

A majority of the council voted against taking a "councilmatic" .1% sales tax increase, as well as a .2% increase on either the November or February ballot.

Councilor Adrian Cortes pushed back on the decision to leave it up to voters, in part because of the cost involved with running a special election. Those who were against putting the vote on the November or February ballot voiced concerns on whether that allowed the council enough time to place the groundwork for the ballot measure to successfully pass.

Cortes said the council doesn't go to a vote of the people on all of its decisions, like when it approves the city's annual budget.

"They voted us into office to make these hard decisions," Cortes said.

Cortes also took another shot at the county's sales tax, which he said is evidence of "extraordinarily sloppy leadership" by the Clark County Council.

"It would make me feel better knowing that this money is staying in our community, it's not going out to the county to fund whatever their pet projects are," Cortes said.

Cortes said any sales tax measure would need to be as successful as the city's 2020 annexation into Clark County Fire District 3. Though the annexation increased property taxes on those in the city, the additional funding was used for a variety of city services, which included roads.

"That was truly an initiative where we communicated well with voters and we followed through on every single thing we said we were going to do with that extra revenue," Cortes said.

Though the council voted down potential sales tax measures, they may revisit the issue next month. After an inquiry from a few councilors about bringing the issue back, Battle Ground City Manager Erin Erdman said anyone from the "prevailing side" of the options considered — in this case those who voted the options down — can move to reconsider it at the council's July 5 meeting.

more flexible. He suggested the implementation of a civilian report-writing unit to help document the calls that come in.

Horch said the department is currently looking at co-responding units to address mental health calls. Much like the overarching issue at the sheriff's office, staffing among mental health professionals for that response has proven the biggest hurdle.

Alongside building relationships with mental and behavioral health professionals, Reynolds is supportive of having officers who are dedicated to responding to those types of calls alongside the outside help.

Establishing units focused on property crimes is another improvement tied to an increase of staffing, Horch said.

Reynolds said he would put together an "intensive intervention task force," which would specifically target different types of crime not being adequately ad-

ressed. That could help with escalating property crime, he said.

Shook favored a focus on the more organized instances of property crime as the best way to prioritize services with the limited resources the sheriff's office currently has.

Candidates were also asked how they would enforce new gun laws banning the sale of high-capacity magazines, restricting production of hard-to-track "ghost guns" and prohibiting firearms at government buildings.

"If a law itself does not con-

form to the constitution, as your sheriff, I will not be enforcing that law," Reynolds said.

Like other elected executives, Shook said the sheriff has the opportunity to evaluate laws, stressing he would also focus on their constitutionality.

Horch said a number of sheriffs who came out against the enforcement of those laws have since recanted their statements after being contacted by the state attorney general's office. Through conversations with the county prosecuting attorney's office,

Horch said he believes he has the discretion needed to determine how the enforcement of state law would look.

"Do I have carte blanche to say a law is unconstitutional? No, I do not believe that. But there are ways that a sheriff has to use discernment and discretion when applying it to certain laws," Horch said.

All three candidates will take part in Washington's Aug. 2 primary. The top-two candidates will move onto the November general election.

person suffers a cardiac arrest... the best method for correcting the problem is to defibrillate or shock the heart out of that rhythm."

He also noted CPR is not enough to save a person's life in a situation like that, which is why an AED is crucial to have on hand in public spaces like schools, churches or shopping centers.

Martell was happy to see his friends again after he recovered. He was able to see them right before the school year ended.

"I'm feeling great, same as normal before the accident," Martell said. "It was nice getting

back (to school) besides allergies. I got to see all my old friends, the friends that I have, and all my teachers and the people that helped me as I was there."

Martell said he made the honor roll and received passing grades in his classes.

When he was in the hospital, Martell said he underwent surgery to implant a pacemaker in his chest. Although broken ribs are common from chest compressions during CPR, Martell said he had no broken ribs following the incident.

During the summer, Martell plans to hang out with his family and go boating with them. He also plans to get a job when he turns 16 in August.

abortion in Washington in past sessions.

"As a result of the court ruling, I hope we see our state move in a similar direction," Kraft said.

In his own response, Washington Senate Republican Leader John Braun, R-Centralia, noted

the supreme court decision will not affect abortion access in the state which has laws protecting the procedure.

"However, better support for pregnant women who choose to give birth should be a common goal for all of us, regardless of our politics," Braun said in a statement. "Compassion and empathy, rather than hostility, should be the universal approach. I'm hoping this is how we all move forward."

Democratic Vancouver state Sen. Annette Cleveland said she was "appalled to see the Court reverse 50 years of legal precedents that protect the right to choose."

"The right to an abortion has been settled law for generations," Cleveland said in her statement.

She said her grandmother told

her how monumental the Roe V. Wade ruling was at the time it happened.

"I made a promise to her then to protect that right for the next generations, and yet today, my grown daughter is facing a country without choice," Cleveland said.

Cleveland pointed to action taken by the Legislature this year in House Bill 1851 which codified abortion protections into state law.

"The high court's radical reversal of 50 years of existing law is a valuable reminder that our state can, and must, pass laws to protect Washingtonians' rights from those who would discard legal precedent and recast our laws to satisfy ideological agendas," Cleveland said.

One person killed in crash in Hockinson

A two-car collision in southeast Hockinson left a 50-year-old Brush Prairie man dead on Friday, June 24, the Clark County Sheriff's Office reported.

Shortly before 10 a.m. on June 24, the sheriff's office, along with fire and emergency medical personnel, responded to the collision at the intersection of Northeast 212th Avenue and Northeast Powell Road.

The investigation determined a vehicle operated by a 16-year-old, who was not named in the sheriff's office's release, was driving northbound on Northeast 212th Avenue with Benjamin Andrews, 50, in the front passenger seat. Another vehicle, driven by Roberta Russo, 39, of Camas, was turning south from Powell Road onto 212th Avenue.

The other vehicle hit the left-side front of Russo's vehicle, and both rotated and left the roadway due to the force of the impact, the release stated. The vehicle occupied by Andrews hit a utility pole and caught fire. Bystanders used fire extinguishers to keep the fire at bay while others removed the occupants.

Andrews died at the scene after sustaining fatal injuries, the release stated. The 16-year-old was treated at an area hospital for non-life-threatening injuries. Russo was traveling with her children who are 6 and 9, all of whom were taken to the hospital with non-life-threatening injuries.

The sheriff's office determined excessive speed was a factor in the collision. It is under investigation by the Clark County Sheriff's Office Traffic Unit.

Crisis of crime argues for public safety tax

On June 6, the Battle Ground City Council voted against Clark County's Proposition 11 for public safety funding. As leaders of a grassroots effort to fight crime in our communities, we support the proposed .1% sales tax increase.

The county and its cities — in a 60/40 split, as required by law — must spend the money on public safety and criminal justice.

We are all in it together. Crimes committed in Vancouver, Ridgefield, Battle Ground, or in unincorporated locations, likely will impact the rest. Criminals do not observe borders.

We, advocates, are all too aware of today's financial stresses, but crime in our communities has become a crisis we can no longer defer. Proposition 11 is a necessary response to a spike in crime that is crippling individuals, especially the vulnerable, struggling families and businesses large and small.

Thefts of catalytic converters are up 10,000% since 2019 and vehicle thefts have increased by 88% since 2021. Home deliveries of packages are now routinely stolen. Most of those responsible are young males driving stolen cars or with no license plates to avoid detection. They lie in wait in neighborhoods following delivery trucks and opportunistically stealing at will. Few are apprehended, much less charged or punished. New unwise laws hamper police response.

Some local grocery stores are experiencing crime hourly. Law-abiding patrons watch as brazen shoplifters exit stores, carts piled high with stolen goods.

What message does this lack of accountability send to other potential criminals? Even more important, what are young people learning? If this decline in respect for law continues, where will our society be in a decade? Who will then volunteer for law enforcement under such conditions?

The most fundamental obligation of government is public safety. The failure we are experiencing promotes chaos. Individuals conclude they must provide for their own and their family's security. Are we prepared for

widespread and justifiable self-protection?

Last January, a large group of concerned and affected people from many neighborhoods, including many representing our region's large businesses such as Fred Meyer and Safeway, joined our Zoom call to sound the alarm about spiking crime. Elected officials joined from Vancouver and the county. Law enforcement from cities and the county participated. They offered much needed advice, too often ignored.

We identified solutions. This proposed Proposition 11, a sales tax of 10 cents per every \$100 spent, is part of a comprehensive effort we are advocating. We know a variety of approaches are needed. First, establish trust, transparency and accountability between law enforcement and county residents by finally procuring body cameras and the funding needed every year for maintenance and training. Additional funds are required to be spent on public safety or criminal justice.

Battle Ground's council members believe they do not need the additional funding for public safety, but we contend their voters will disagree.

Second on our to-do list, is addressing morale and recruitment/retention, because Clark County has earned the dubious distinction of being "the lowest of the low" in law enforcement staffing, in the state and nation. Ask law enforcement why this is and take action to correct deficiencies.

Third; revise the unwise state laws passed in 2020 that tipped the balance in law enforcement strongly in favor of the criminal. Listen to law enforcement as to how to write fair but reasonable laws about pursuit and probable cause. Only minimal progress was made in 2021.

Finally; plan for, design, remodel, and/or build a humane, safe and effective jail. Today's failing county jail is contributing to the public safety crisis.

Salmon Creek to the Fremont Bridge will take 60 minutes, up from 29 minutes today. That is after spending \$5 billion on the IBR and another \$1.5 billion for Portland's Rose Quarter project.

Even worse, Oregon wants you to help pay for the Rose Quarter project with variable rate tolls. The IBR is also recommending variable rate tolls on the replacement bridge. People will pay double tolls to drive I-5 for work or recreation in Portland. They will create "roads for the rich." Most people have no option when they report to work.

In the failed Columbia River Crossing (CRC), they estimated \$8 tolls potentially costing people \$2,000 per year.

The current proposal is to replace the current three-lane bridge with another three through lane bridge. This is worse than the failed CRC

because they want only one auxiliary lane for merging and weaving. Three auxiliary lanes were on the table at one point, but legislators and elected leaders were never given the chance to say how big the bridge should be.

They were never given the choice to pick transit either. Our C-Tran Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) is cheaper, faster, and seats more people than Portland's MAX light rail. C-Tran's BRT costs \$5.44 per boarding passenger versus MAX's \$8.24. A BRT bus can seat 60% of passengers whereas MAX only seats 40%, leaving the majority standing. The MAX Yellow Line travels only 14 mph whereas C-Tran express buses travel nearly twice that speed.

The failed CRC was a "bridge too low." The current proposed 116 feet of clearance for marine traffic is about to be rejected by the Coast Guard —

another bridge too low.

The IBR team implies they can't build higher than 116 feet. Administrator Greg Johnson told legislators a "moveable span" could cost \$400 million, an attempt to scare them with a huge price. The I-205 bridge has 144 feet of clearance.

The failed CRC would pay \$86.4 million in "mitigation" to three up-river firms which need clearances up to 150 feet. Adjusted for inflation, the mitigation costs are now above \$100 million of taxpayer dollars.

Here is a suggestion. Eliminate the \$1.3 billion MAX light rail extension. Choose a \$50 million C-Tran BRT line, save \$1.25 billion, and build a higher bridge. Or they can use some of the savings to add a "movable span."

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UFO house in Brush Prairie delights science fiction enthusiasts as Airbnb

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To the delight of science fiction fans, Kirby and Patricia Swatosh created an Airbnb at their home in Brush Prairie in the shape of a UFO in August of last year.

Growing up in the 1960s, Kirby was inspired to fulfill one of his childhood dreams that was spurred by his favorite sci-fi shows and movies.

“I could say (it was inspired) from the abduction, but that wouldn’t be accurate,” said Kirby with a laugh. “It was basically born out of a childhood dream growing up in the ‘60s in the NASA generation with shows like ‘Lost in Space’ and ‘Star Trek.’ I was hit at an early age with optimism of anything being possible.”

Kirby said a direct inspiration for the design was seeing the “Jupiter 2” spaceship in Lost in Space.

“I was always enamored with the design of that ship. We practically needed a space to put our lawn equipment and the cars my teenage boys ended up getting, so we built a garage and the idea was to put a shop on top of it,” he said. “The shop turned into the spaceship, and for that, I can thank my wife for encouraging me.”

Kirby admitted the original intention was to craft the spaceship into a “man cave” or “party space.” Since Kirby is a musician, he also considered using it as a recording studio or renting it out to other bands, but that never came to fruition.

It took the Swatoshs a total of seven years to build the UFO. Once they completed it in August, they listed the space on Airbnb

and, “the rest, as they say, is history,” Kirby said.

The spaceship is made of “traditional stick-frame construction” and is on top of a two-car garage with a “daylight basement style,” he said. The outer walls are made of torch down material, which he said is typically used for flat roofs, which he then painted silver.

The spaceship was the first time Kirby took on a construction project of this size. His cousin helped with the labor, while Kirby crafted the blueprint. Other family members and friends also helped with the roof and the plumbing.

There’s been a great demand for reservations, Kirby said. Most of July has been booked out and the Airbnb usually has a “smattering of bookings” in August and October.

“It’s been pretty popular, and honestly, it kind of gets to where it feels weird when somebody isn’t there. It’s been a nice surprise,” Kirby said. “We didn’t anticipate it to be as popular as it has been. We didn’t think people would love it as much as we do, but it turns out, there’s a lot of like-minded people out there who like the fantasy aspect of it.”

He said the inside of the spaceship features a mixture of a retro futuristic 1960s aesthetic with silver, gray, and red accents.

“There are homages to Star Wars, Star Trek, and obviously the Lost in Space aspect heavily influenced it. There’s parts of the interior that reflect how it looked on the ship from the show,” Kirby explained.

The space also features a bar, TV, Blu-ray player, bathroom,

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All Natural Pet Supply in Battle Ground opened a cat hotel earlier this year to provide a boarding facility for pet owners when they head out of town.

General Manager Kymber Webb loves what she does especially since she gets to spend time with the cats who come through the door.

"We have seven rooms that are two different sizes just for cats that need to be boarded overnight," Webb said. "We have people who have stayed up to a month at a time. A lot of people like to board their cats during the Fourth of July so that their cats don't escape from the fireworks."

More pets are lost on the Fourth of July than any other day of the year, according to Webb, due to the startling nature of the fireworks.

Webb said the cat hotel provides the animals with a calm environment and also provides staff a chance to love on the cats during their stay.

Webb said other cat hotel locations, like ones in Vancouver, are often booked out over six months in advance. As of right now, Webb said the rooms at her cat hotel have not yet been filled to capacity.

The facility is designed to keep the cats occupied, while also giving them the space they need.

"Every room (in the cat hotel) has structures for playing, climbing, or scratching," Webb said. "Our team goes back there multiple times during the day and cuddles and brushes the cats who enjoy that. We let them out and we got a room that they can go out to with cats of their own household and play during the day."

She said all of the rooms include multiple beds and blankets. There's also "sky boxes" that reach up to the ceiling for the cats to explore. Each room can hold up to three cats from the same household.

Webb said some cats paw at the door on their first day and are ready to play with staff, while others take a couple of days to warm up to the people caring for them.

"All of the cats we've had so far, by the end of the stay, they're pretty friendly with the staff and taking treats from us and stuff like that," Webb said.

Since the cat hotel opened in April, Webb said they have received positive feedback. The pet hotel is located within the All Natural Pet Supply storefront. Webb said some of the brands the store carries offer specials to those who utilize the boarding facility, like free bags of kibble or raw food. She hopes other brands will follow in the same footprints to bring more offers to pet owners.

"A lot of our brands from within the store are really supporting the hotel and customers who stay in it," she said. "I think we'll pretty regularly be having promotions crossed between the cat hotel and the store, because we really want to take care of the people (whose cats) are staying here as much as we can. The more we can build a community around it, I think the better."

The luxury suite costs \$35 a night, while the larger deluxe studio is \$45 a night. There's a minimum of a two-night stay required. If the stay is longer than two weeks, the customers receive a 10% discount, Webb said.

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Junk Management turns trash into treasure

Dan Cain, the owner of Clark County-based Junk Management, uses his expertise to turn one person's trash into a treasure for others.

His business salvages junk from people's property throughout Clark County and then repurposes it for other causes.

One example of that is Cain's garden which features recycled materials. He recently grew tomatoes using plastic milk jugs

and plastic wrap after he saw a video that utilized a similar method. The milk jug method bumped his garden production ahead a couple of weeks, Cain said.

"I was trying to be innovative and not have to spend more money," Cain said.

Cain makes do with what he has as he experiments frequently with different gardening techniques. He utilizes the resources he gathers in different ways, which is a process Cain said has been rewarding.

"(I'm) able to say 'alright, I put the work in and look, it actually worked,'" Cain said.

Aside from the dirt he utilized, Cain said the other materials for his garden didn't cost him anything since he upcycled and repurposed materials. He created

his garden beds from a shed he tore down, utilizing the wood from the structure for the boxes that contain the soil and plants.

Cain said almost anything from someone's property can be repurposed. Wood from the back of one's property can be upcycled into something else, or pallets can be crafted into good containers for plants if they feature all natural wood with no staining.

"You can upcycle almost anything, depending on the purpose, so that's what we're shooting for, just to keep our impact on the environment as small as possible," Cain said.

Cain noted he utilized spice racks in his garden that were once

used at Jake's Crawfish in Portland as well as another shed he tore down in Battle Ground.

"We're Junk Management, we're not just junk removal. We're changing junk removal as we know it," Cain said. "We're not just taking our truck and dumping it. We're taking everything we possibly can and processing it. ... If there's stuff that's valuable otherwise, rather than just using it in a garden, we try to get it a new home as well. We upcycle as much as we possibly can."

Cain said his efforts are worth it in the end as he saves "thousands of pounds" of recycled materials each week that would have otherwise gone to landfills. He has two trailers he stores the materials in and is able to keep the capacity under control.

If Cain gets too much material at a jobsite, he takes it to local recycling centers.

Junk Management opened about a year ago and Cain has since gained a following through social media. His family is involved in the business, as they share his dream of recycling as much as possible.

The Fall of a Lying Nation







Washington Firewood Law

State law requires firewood to be sold by the cord or fraction of a cord. A cord is 128 cubic feet, which is a stack 4 feet wide, 4 feet tall, and 8 feet long; or equivalent. A cord of wood cut 16 inches long would be three stacks 4 feet tall and 8 feet long.

The terms "rack," "unit," "pile," and "truckload" are not to be used when advertising firewood. State law requires that a delivery ticket or sales invoice be presented by the seller to the purchaser at the time of sale. The sales invoice is to include the name and address of the seller, name and address of buyer, quantity delivered, price, and date of delivery. State law suggests that firewood be described for sale by species such as 50 percent oak and 50 percent alder.
